

## STUDENTS' SPORTS.

### Last and Best Meet of the Detroit High School Athletic Association.

The most successful field day of the Detroit high school athletic association, both in the number of entries and good form shown by the contestants, was held on the grounds of the D. A. C. this afternoon. As many entries are encouraged as possible, the beneficial results of training, the main object sought for, being as possible to the runner who can only do a mile, for instance, in 5:30, as the one who can do his under that.

One hundred yards dash, final heat—Robert Beathe, scratch, 11 seconds; H. R. Dingwall, 2½ yards, second.

Standing high jump—F. A. Hinchman, 1 inch, 4 feet 4 inches; Hugh Mulheron second.

Standing broad jump—F. A. Hinchman, scratch, 9 feet 6 inches; George Jerome, second.

One-half mile bicycle race—W. Fales, scratch, 1:47 2-5; Robert Wagner, scratch, second.

Two hundred and twenty yards dash—Robt. Beathe, scratch, 24 4-5 seconds; J. W. Day, 5 yards, second.

Running high jump—Theo. Luce, 1 inch, 4:11; F. A. Hinchman, 2 inches, second.

Four hundred and forty yard dash—A dead heat between Ed. Warner, five yards, and Horace Johnson, 10 yards, in 57 seconds. Johnson won the ran-off.

Base ball throw—W. H. Flynn, 307:1; A. M. Hill second.

Eight hundred and eighty yards run—Ed Ryan, scratch, 2:13 1-6; J. W. Day, second. This was probably the best race of the day, and was run in really good time.

Running broad jump—F. A. Hinchman, 2 inches, 17 feet; C. G. Palmer, second.

One mile run—Horace Johnson, scratch, 5:10 4-5; Robert Waynes, 15 yards, second.

Hop, step and jump—F. A. Hinchman, 6 inches, 37:6; C. G. Palmer, 10 inches, second.

One-quarter mile walk—Ed Ryan, scratch, 1:44 4-5; J. G. Hurty, two yards, second.

One hundred and twenty yards hurdle—Theo. Luce, eight yards, 15 4-5; W. R. Frazer, seven yards, second.

The one mile relay race was postponed until next Tuesday at 5 o'clock.

After the sports an interesting and hotly-contested game of base ball was held between the high school nine and the U. of M. freshmen. The score was 10 to 10 when the game was called on account of darkness. Batteries—Dingwall and Hinchman, Van Nortwick and Dodge.
