

A GREAT SUCCESS.

THE HIGH SCHOOL FIELD GAMES HELD YESTERDAY.

THE EVENTS WERE GENERALLY CLOSE AND INTERESTING.

FRANK IVES MAKES A RUN OF 5,000 POINTS AT LONDON.

The U. of M. Athletic Team Will Compete in Chicago.

The members of the High School Athletic Association have good reason to congratulate themselves on the success of their seventh annual field games, which took place at the D. A. C. grounds yesterday afternoon. The weather was excellent and the crowd good, the ladies especially turning out in large numbers. The contests were interesting, and several of them very close, notably the 5-mile bicycle race. In this latter, the scratch man, closed up on the leaders soon after the start, and it soon became apparent that it was to be a contest between him and Benham, a 125-yard man. These two alternated in the lead until the last hundred yards, when Benham drew slightly ahead and finished about three feet before his rival. In nearly all of the events the club records of last year were beaten. There was a stiff breeze blowing in the early part of the afternoon, but it died away later. In the mile run Holmes, who started against the wishes of his friends, having been sick for several days, was seized with a cramp in the third quarter and had to give up. Best, in the final of the 100-yards, fell when near the finish, and Stanford, who was his closest competitor, came in first. The hop, step and jump was postponed incidentally on account of the intensity of the heat when the other events were finished. The following are the summaries of the events:

100-yards dash—First heat: D. Hunt, scratch, won; J. Marker, 2 yards, second; time, 13.4 seconds. Second heat: H. Allen, 2 yards, won; C. Goodrich, 2 yards, second; time, 11 seconds. Third heat: Starkey scratch, 10 yards, won; W. Sutton, 4 yards, second; time, 10.4 seconds. Final heat for second place: Starkey, 10 yards, won; 11 seconds. Final heat: Starkey, Stanford won, W. Sutton second; time, 10.8 seconds.

220-yards—Stanford, 8 yards, won; Marker, 6 yards, second; time, 24.5 seconds.

440-yards—D. Paulson, 15 yards, won; C. Foster, second; second; B. H. Spover, 5 yards, third; time, 55.2 seconds.

880-yards—C. Foster, scratch, won; Hall, 15 yards, second; time, 2:24 3/4.

Mile run—B. H. Spover, scratch, won; D. Groh, 15 yards, second; time, 5:22.

120-yards hurdle—First heat: J. Marker, 8 yards penalty, won; L. Hall, 4 yards penalty, second; time, 17.8 seconds. Final heat: J. Marker won; L. Hall second; G. S. Benson third; time, 17.5 seconds.

One-mile bicycle—P. Walker, scratch, won; G. W. Benham, 40 yards, second; P. Bailor, scratch, third; time, 4:22 1/4.

Five-mile bicycle—G. W. Benham, 125 yards, first; P. Bailor, scratch, second; time, 16:14 1/2.

Handicap broad jump—J. Clark, 12 inches, won, 18 feet 1 inch actual jump; G. Gardner, 15 inches, second, 17 feet 8 inches actual jump; Starkey, Stanford, 18 inches, third, 17 feet 3 inches actual jump.

Handicap high jump—G. Miller, scratch, won, 5 feet 7 inches actual jump; H. Allen, 1 inch, and J. Clark, 6 inches, were tied for second, and Clark won a silver cup.

Five yards—V. Jory, 18 inches, won, 8 feet actual jump; J. Clark, 14 inches, second, 7 feet 9 inches actual jump; H. Allen, scratch, third, 5 feet 2 inches actual jump.

After the field events were over, the D. H. S. and the Ann Arbor High School teams played a game that kept the blood of the student enthusiasts at fever heat. Bennett pitched a splendid game, allowing his opponents but one hit. The score was six runs throughout and the game was not decided until the very end. Larsons played an excellent game behind the bat. Duff, Costner and McKenzie played their positions well and Nock, without help, executed a shabby play at the time that it was most needed. The score:
