

YOUNG ATHLETES' WORK

LANSING'S STAR MEN AGAIN AHEAD IN THE HIGH SCHOOL MEET.

DETROITERS PUSHED THEM AND WON OUTSIDE BICYCLE EVENTS.

The Records Were Very Creditable Considering the Wet Track.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 28.—(Special.)—The interscholastic meet closed to-day in a blaze of glory for Michigan's youthful athletes. Despite incerting clouds and frequent showers this afternoon, the meet has been an unqualified success and everybody from the competing athletes to their crowds of supporters has had a splendid time. The athletic talent from Lansing again proved its superiority by winning the highest number of points, although Detroit came in such a close second that the result was in doubt until the last event had been won.

The high schools finished in the following order: Lansing, 42 points; Detroit, 37; Ann Arbor, 35; Warren, 8; Gay City, 7; Pontiac, 5; Greenville, 2. The fine showing made by the few representative schools from the smaller schools shows that they have good athletic material in them, and will encourage them to send more men next year.

The crowd had a chance to give the Thirtieth Regiment a rousing reception as the three specialists, containing the crowd packed by the athletic men, and Mr. Yastice, as he stood on the platform, heard as a first well the famous 15 of 31, with a hundred's of many voices. Another feature was the over-worn quarter-mile relay race between the 1901 boys and 1902 boys. It was won by the former team, composed of Harshberg, Westphal and Thompson, in 44 seconds. The boys' races were held at the fair grounds in the morning and, while the time was not starting, the results were very exciting. In each event there was a gold of fourteen runners, the consisting three boys. McCarrick, the plucky little rigger from Lansing, won both events, while Fuller, of Ann Arbor, and Doherty, of Detroit, divided the rest of the points. A jockey showed made the track at Detroit Field a little busy for the first time in its existence, yet every event was fully participated and every finish a game one.

With the bicycle race shown out, Detroit would have won the meet, as her representatives won more field events than did Lansing. Ella Cook did better in the race as well as the time trial event, while Roberts and Stenseth won the half-mile and one mile with a swift field of competitors. Christopher and Johnson were Lansing's bicycle stars, the former winning three times and two seconds and being largely responsible for Lansing's victory. Doherty, of Detroit, and Stenseth, of Gay City, also did well. The beautiful gold silver and bronze medals were distributed in the case of the meet. Next year the athletic association will offer a trophy cup to the winning high school, respectively.
