

SCHOOL BOYS DID WELL

INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET WAS RIGHT UP TO THE MARK.

GRAND RAPIDS AND ANN ARBOR TIED FOR FIRST PLACE.

DETROIT UNIVERSITY WAS THIRD AND ORCHARD LAKE FOURTH.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 26.—(Special).—The University of Michigan's third interscholastic meet closed most successfully today. Grand Rapids and Ann Arbor were tied for first place, and the Detroit university school, by putting up a wonderfully good race in the relay, landed safely in third place. The meet was remarkable for its closeness, and for the way in which the events were split up. The time made in the events was surprising, many of them being won in a manner which would keep the university's athletes hustling. One interscholastic record, the pole vault, was broken by Keena, of Detroit, who cleared the bar one inch higher than has been done before.

The best individual performers were Bennett, of Orchard Lake; Widdcomb, of Grand Rapids, who took both the mile and half mile in splendid shape, and Thompson, of Pontiac, Cleveland, the only team from outside of the state, carried off ten points, including first in the quarter-mile bicycle, in the kicking and punting contest held this morning. Gilkey, of Plainwell, won the cup by some of the best punting that has been seen on Regent's field. He dropped three goals from different angles from the 20-yard line. The meet was run off promptly and without a hitch, and a pleased lot of youthful athletes are making Ann Arbor lively to-night with their rival high school yells. Results:
