

DETROIT HIGH SCHOOL WON

BEATING OUT ANN ARBOR BY ONE POINT IN INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET.

KEELER OF THE WINNING TEAM MADE A SPLENDID RECORD.

OTHER DETROIT SCHOOLS MAKE CREDITABLE SHOWING.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 25.—(Special).—The Detroit Central high school won the interscholastic meet held here this afternoon in a blaze of glory by winning a strong second in the relay race. This was the last event on the programme, and the result of the meet was in doubt until the finish. The final scores stood: D. C. H. S., 34; Ann Arbor, 33; Detroit University school, 19; Cleveland University school, 17; Detroit School for Boys and Grand Rapids were tied for fifth place with a score of 16. A heavy cold rain started just after the events were commenced, and consequently prevented any record-breaking. Early in the afternoon the Ann Arbor High school looked like a sure winner, but the work of Speik, of Chicago, in the field events and of Keeler, Hayes and Osborn for the D. C. H. S., soon showed that the affair was to be closely contested. First the joyous yells of one side and then of the other would sound across the field and track, but the Detroit grit and brawn were not to be denied, and after the last event was run, the boys wearing the "blue and white" were seen proudly carrying the

championship banner and cup up State street. Keeler, of the D. C. H. S. team, is looked upon as a coming athlete, as his work throughout the meet was little less than phenomenal. All the contestants with the exception of the Michigan Military academy are well satisfied with the result and the work of the officials.

CHICAGO STUDENTS CELEBRATED. Held Monster Bonfire Over Selection of City for Olympian Games.

Chicago, May 25.—Students of Chicago University, assisted by delegations from Northwestern and Lake Forest universities, and all the other colleges and high schools of Chicago to-night celebrated in vigorous fashion the selection of Chicago as the place of holding the Olympian games of 1904. All week hundreds of students have been collecting oil and tar barrels and everything else that would make a good blaze. The result was a bonfire, which in size and power of illumination was not far behind a lumber yard conflagration.

Around this 2,000 students marched, making a most terrific din with all manner of horns and megaphones and cheers. A burlesque programme on the Olympian games was carried out, the victors being awarded immense laurel wreaths. Speeches were made by Profs. Stagg and Thatcher, of the university faculty, H. J. Furber and others. Fully 6,000 persons witnessed the sport, which was kept up until after midnight.

Field Day at Centreville.

Centreville, Mich., May 25.—Field day was observed to-day at this place by the high schools of St. Joseph county. Although it was cold and stormy, about 1,500 people were present and the entire programme given. Charles M. Williams of Ann Arbor, acted as referee of the various athletic sports. In the pole vault the county record was raised 2½ inches by Emery Pitts, of Centreville, he winning by a vault of 9 feet 4 inches. The half-mile run was won by Joseph Yeager, of Centreville, in 2:22. Three Rivers high school won the meet by scoring 81 points, Centreville 68, Constantine 34, Sturgis 11, Colon 5, Burr Oak 3.

At the oratorical contest in the evening Roy D. Lehr, of Centreville, was awarded the gold medal. Edward French, of Three Rivers, was awarded a gold medal for scoring the highest number of points of any contestant in the sports.
