

THE ATHLETES FROM DETROIT WERE WINNERS

In Fifth Annual Field and
Track Meet.

KALAMAZOO IS THIRD

Edmands, Bowen, Gilbert and Wood-
hams Being Stars.

IN SEVERAL OF THE EVENTS

Two big Schools From Detroit Ran
Away From the Bunch Followed
by Kazoo, Grand Rapids and
Orchard Lake.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 17. Special.
In a walk the Detroit athletes captured the fifth annual intercollegiate field and track meet held on Ferry field. The athletics were under the auspices of the University of Michigan Athletic association.

After the few leaders among the high schools, the remainder of the 30 entered in the league struggled along with a few scattering points. The well trained athletes from the Detroit university school and from the Detroit central high school showed early that they had things their own way and the meet resolved itself into a contest between the two big schools. It was nip and tuck and the last event settled the score, making the university school's total score 38 and the central high school's total 34.

Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids tied for third with 17 points each; Michigan Military academy came next with 16.

Outside of the work of the Detroiters the Kalamazoo boys starred. Edmands of Kalamazoo took first in the broad jump with Bowen of the same school third. Gilbert, also of Kalamazoo, won the football kicking contest at 50 yards plus. His punting was exceptionally accurate. Bowen took second in the discus. The hurdles were captured by Nicol of the Detroit Central high school and Keeler, D. U. S., and Frankla, D. U. S., covered themselves with glory in the dashes.

The weather was perfect and records went flying in every event but the mile, two mile and shot put. One of the surprises was the victory of Johnson of the Chicago north side division high school in the two mile.

Throwing 12-pound hammer--Curtis, Wayne, first, 128 feet 11 inches; Fullenbinder, South Haven, second, 114 feet 3 inches; Pease, D. U. S., third, 112 feet 2 inches.

Putting 12-pound shot--Hewitt, Grand Haven, first, 38 feet 5 inches; Davidson, D. U. S., second, 37 feet 9½ inches; Pease, D. U. S., third; 37 feet 8 inches.

Pole vault--Reid, Ann Arbor, first, 10 feet; Wlerengo, Muskegon and Cottle, Muskegon, tied at 9 feet 10 inches.

Discus throw--Gairrels, Detroit Central high school, first; Bowen, Kalamazoo, second; Earle, D. U. S., third. Distance 101 feet.

Woodhams was the only Kalamazoo man to make any show in the dashes, getting fourth in the 100-yard sprint. Detroit took everything in the dashes.

The Kalamazoo boys on their return home stated that it was announced on the field that Kalamazoo had scored 22 points to its credit.
