

## THE INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

In the annual Interscholastic Meet, May 22-23, Lewis Institute won with a total of 42 points. Detroit University School, last year's champions, secured second place with 28½ points, while Ann Arbor, Detroit Central High, and Grand Rapids finished in the order named with 20, 17, and 16 points respectively to their credit.

Though the threatening weather made conditions unfavorable for the best kind of track work, seven records were broken. In the quarter mile Barker, of Evanston, lowered the former record of 63¾ seconds to 54½. McClear, of Evanston, broke the mile record 8½ seconds, by running the distance in 4 minutes 46½ seconds. With a jump of 5 feet 7 inches, Lawton of Detroit Central High, beat Keena's former record by two inches. In the running broad jump Hogenson, of Lewis Institute, eclipsed all former performances by a jump of 22 feet 1 inch. Thatcher's vault of 10 feet 8 inches, entitled Lewis Institute to another interscholastic record. In the shot-put Hewitt, of Grand Rapids, lacked but a half-inch of breaking by a foot the former record held by Speik, of Chicago North Division.

Lewis Institute also lowered the former relay record by ¼ second.

Of the individual performances, Hogenson, of Lewis Institute, surpassed all the others, winning 18 points besides running on the successful relay team. Nicol scored 10 points by winning both hurdles. Besides winning the half-mile, Daane, of Grand Rapids, finished an excellent second in the mile-run.

## MICHIGAN WINS CONFERENCE MEET AND OWNS SPALDING CUP

By winning the greatest number of points in the western college conference meet for the third successive year, Michigan gets permanent possession of the handsome Spalding cup. Michigan secured forty-nine points, more than the forecasters had credited her with. On the other hand Chicago also so far surpassed the predictions, that had Michigan not won more than she seemed likely to win, Chicago would undoubtedly have taken the meet. Chicago had forty points, while Wisconsin, whom many picked to beat Chicago, and who stood third, had but ten. The remaining points were divided.

The day was not good for the sports. It was cold and a disheartening drizzle fell most of the afternoon. The track, however, was in good condition, and in spite of the weather, five conference records were broken, four of them by Michigan men, as follows:—

100-yards dash—Blair, Chicago, 0:09¾.

220-yards dash—Hahn, Michigan, 0:21¾.

Two-mile run—Kellogg, Michigan, 10:02¾.
