

COLBURN WAS BEST ATHLETE

CAPTURED ALL-ROUND CHAMPIONSHIP AT D. U. S.

WENDELL WAS SECOND BEST
AND NICOL WAS THIRD.

ONLY FIVE ATHLETES TOOK
PART IN COMPETITION.

A big crowd saw the all-round outdoor athletic championship decided at the Detroit University school yesterday, first honors being carried off by Colburn, who won the indoor championship in D. U. S. The score, which was according to the Yale system, was very close, Wendell leading Colburn by 211 points up to the last event, which was the mile run. Williams won this event, but Colburn finished second, thus giving him an additional 610 points, enough to make him winner of the Trinity cup, with a lead of 585 points over Wendell, who was second in the competition. The scoring was done on a basis of 1,000 points for a world's record in each event, and deducting a stated number of points for each fraction of an inch or second that the contestant failed of equalling the mark.

Although but five athletes competed for the championship, some excellent records were made. Williams ran the 100 yards in 12.5 seconds, equalling the Michigan intercollegiate record, which entitles him to a D. U. S. sweater. Williams also ran the mile in 4 minutes, 55 seconds, 4.5 of an inch better than the time made by Colburn, the time made very close. This is remarkable considering that both athletes competed in seven events before running the mile.

Wendell ran a time total in the 400 yards and negotiated the distance in 6.5 seconds, thus setting the intercollegiate record. Silver medals were awarded to the winners in each event and bronze medals to the second.

Summary of Events.

The results in the various events follow:

- 100-yard dash—Wendell, 12.5 seconds.
- 200-yard dash—Williams, 23.5 seconds.
- 100-yard low hurdles—Nicol, 12.5 seconds.
- Mile run—Williams, 4 minutes 55 seconds.
- Hammer throw—Wendell, 24 feet.
- Shot put—Colburn, 38 feet 7.5 inches.
- High jump—Nicol and Colburn tied at 4 feet.
- Bread jump—Wendell, 58 feet 1 inch.
- Pole vault—Wendell, 7 feet 1 inch.

The relay race for which schools to decide the championship of the city, which was postponed from the A. A. U. meet here on June 6, has been run at the muddy track. Central High took the first and won it until the fourth relay. At this stage Shaw had a good lead of 100 yards, but the latter made it up and finished his relay three yards in his advance. Jerton was unable to overtake R. Keeler and D. U. S. won in a close finish by three yards. Six boys competed on each side. The time was 2 minutes 41 seconds.

Impending Track Team Protested.

Menominee, Mich., June 15.—The Menominee high school track team has sent to E. H. Curstock, of Houghton, secretary of the board of control of the State Intercollegiate Athletic Association, a protest against the impending track team. Following was the upper peninsula track meet and it is said that the team was not made up of bona fide students of the high school, but athletes who were allowed to take one or two studies merely to enter into athletics.
