

## INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

The Detroit University School track team won an unlooked-for but deserved victory over Lewis Institute of Chicago at the Michigan interscholastic meet, held at Ferry Field, May 28. The men from the Chicago institution were counting on certain victory and it was not until late in the contest that D. U. S. appeared as a formidable rival. The deciding event was the relay race in which first place had been conceded to Lewis Institute. However, the unexpected happened. Sparling, for Detroit, and Hoganson of Chicago, were the last runners. Sparling was touched first and got away well in the lead. Hoganson sprinted desperately in an attempt to overtake his competitor, but the lead was too great. Sparling crossed the tape first, and gave the victory to his school by half a point.

The most noteworthy individual work was done by Hoganson of Lewis, and Evvard of

Pontiac, Ill. Each of these athletes won fifteen points and both broke records in their respective events, i.e. in the sprints and in the weight events. In the hurdles the Detroit schoolboys showed themselves the best performers. Smith and Shaw, both of Detroit Central, won first and second places in the low hurdles. Smith also finished first in the high hurdle event, being followed to the tape by Patterson and Shaw. In the high jump Patterson broke the interscholastic record by half an inch. The two-mile run was the best of the distance events. Rowe, of Battle Creek, a pupil of Captain Kellogg of the Varsity team, was the winner. The score by points of the various schools entered was as follows:—

## WESTERN CONFERENCE MEET

For the fifth consecutive time Michigan won first honors at the annual Conference meet. The victory was well earned as the score shows. But three points separated Michigan and Chicago, while Wisconsin was a good third, with a total of twenty-five points or seven points less than Michigan's score. Michigan won because she had the strongest team. Chicago and Wisconsin each won more firsts than Michigan, but their teams lacked the balance of strength which the Varsity displayed.

Hahn was beaten in the dashes. It was evident that he was still handicapped by the foot which had been bothering him for some days before the meet. Rose broke the Conference record in the shot-put by establishing a mark of 47 feet ¼ inch, which surpasses the former record by nearly six feet.

The 220-yard hurdle race was the event that won the day for Michigan. Rose of
