South Haven Wins Victory on Track

Lester's Men Scamper Off With Baseball Game

They battled hard on the diamond and then on the track and when dark came had put a stop to the event. "Mason Ryan," was the legend handed to the athletes of Benton Harbor and South Haven high schools.

On a waterlogged diamond and in a cold rain, South Haven's baseball team won the game 10 to 5. The Benton Harbor team was out of the game in the first inning.

In realization the victors fought like champions in the track meet and routed off with a victory by the narrow score of 47½ to 35½. Benton Harbor won the running broad jump, Owens and Hill shared for Benton Harbor on the diamond; Hills and Clifford Baster were the great point winners in the track events.

For South Haven Capt. Hinz was the "big man" in everything. Behind him, Harry Owens victory off curves and in the weight events, he was a model of courage. Harriet and Brown too, gave the exhibition and Brown the day.

The South Haven team, with a great body of reserves, in uniform marching order, arrived early in the morning on the steamer Pacific from South Haven. It commenced to rain and still late in the morning the clouds poured forth late experience to the delight of the high school athletes. At about 11 o'clock it had stopped raining but the air was cold and damp.

Baseball Boys Win.
The Baster boys, Clifford and Bill, were the greatest point winners for Benton Harbor and their running was most spectacular. Hills surprised everyone by taking the hundred yard dash from his brother. He also won the low hurdle race, was second in the 20 yard dash. Clifford was second in the hundred yard dash, was second in the broad jump and third in the 20 yard dash.

Hinz was easy winner in the weight events. Clifford Baster was eighth in a mile up during the low hurdle race, was first to leave the track and took his place in the 20 yard race, against the third place. But for his injury he would have won the event.
