

# WINNER DECIDED BY TWO POINTS

## D. U. S. Again First in Local School Meet in Which Five Records for D. I. A. L. Were Smashed.

By the narrowest possible margin, the D. U. S. track team again beat its rival, Central High, in the annual D. I. A. L. track and field meet, scoring 51 points to Central's 41, the whole meet being decided by the relay race, the last event, which D. U. S. won easily. Had Central taken just one of the third places which the University school landed, the result would have been a tie. Western and Eastern tied for third honors, or rather place, winning one point each. Turner getting the point for Western in the pole vault, while Eastern's relay team finished third in the relay race, Western not contending.

D. U. S. can thank Dame Fortune for her victory, for had Hawkins been able to compete in the broad jump and run in the relay race the result might have been different. Bobble twisted his ankle while pole vaulting and gave it the final wrench in the first trial of the broad jump, putting him down and out. As it was, Patterson was able to gain the place, showing power in this Hawkins's position in the relay race was taken by Farnsworth, and the shift put Central out of it entirely. Grover tried gamely, but he had been unable to train for it. He and Woodcock were the first runners on the relay team, and the University man took a lead of twenty yards, which Malcolmson and White, in turn, widened, running against Brown and Craig, giving Vaughn a start of thirty yards over Captain Widman. The little fellow ran an awful queer mile, but the gap was too much to close up, especially the way Vaughn ran, and D. U. S. won, eased up. The time made by the University four was just one second behind the interscholastic world's record time, made by the school team last year, and yesterday the four could have easily lowered it. Vaughn and White showed considerably at the finish.

The speed that George Widman showed seemed unlimited, and to the great joy of his followers and surprise of the D. I. A. L. adherents, he took both the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Malcolmson landed but third in these. Ernie Vaughn was there, however, and took both seconds for the 100 yard dash. Joe got one first, taking the low hurdles from South and Craig, but was four-fifths of a second behind his record of last year.

### Records Were Smashed.

A bunch of records went by the boards, five in all being smashed. Ken Arthur, the big captain of the D. U. S. team, was the best performer, breaking all three weight event records, all held by himself. He started in with the shot, putting it 44 feet 10 inches, one foot one inch better than last year. Then he took the discus and tossed it 106 feet 2 1/2 inches, five feet one-quarter inch better than before. His best performance was the bar, hurling the discus 178 feet 2 1/2 inches, adding 27 feet 2 1/2 inches to his last year's mark.

Allen Garretts, another of the famous Johnnie, took the only record for Central, slipping one-fifth of a second off the time in the 100-yard run, doing it in 34.3 seconds. F. Farnsworth and J. E. Williams were the old record holders, each making it in 36 seconds flat. However, this time could have been faster, both Garretts and Woodcock having done better. Woodcock and Spurling led in the event until the turn into the stretch, having held Garretts in the middle all around and nearly boxed him

here, but Allen had the speed and got by and won.

Of course, the credit for the fine smash in the records goes to "Pinkie" Patterson, in his high jump event. He cleared the bar at 7 feet 11 inches, one inch better than last year. It was expected that he would do better, but on his last trial, he opened an old gash on his leg and did not try for a higher record, being satisfied with the first. Hawkins beat the best he ever did, going 2 feet 7 inches, and Torrey upset the dope in this by taking third place.

### Some Pretty Contests.

Hawkins did pretty work in the pole vault, by. Ronalds of D. U. S. and Turner of Western all being tied at 9 feet. Bobble was the only one about to beat it when it was raised three more inches in the three trials afloat, thereby getting first place. In the workout for the second Ronalds also made the light, Turner falling, giving the University the second. Hat the Cowboy been able to beat the little baseball catcher, the result would have been made a tie.

Another pretty race was the half-mile, which Fenwick of Central won. Fred Lawton was sent in to pace the winner, and did his duty, setting it just to Fenwick's liking, the pair leading all the way around, although Sloop, Whelan of D. U. S. and Bockstahler of Western hung close to them on both laps. Lawton stayed in front until the turn into the stretch on the last lap, when his strength gave out and Fenwick took the lead, winning from the two D. U. S. runners, Sloop and Whelan, by a little over a yard.

The mile gallop went to Hanevan of Central, as expected. Jack Wright took third place in this surprising Central, who had figured on nine points in the event. Another surprise was Torrey finishing second in the high hurdles, he not being doped for a place. Patterson was easy winner, and Torrey and Craig fought it out for second. Many thought it a tie, but Torrey won it by a very little. South had perfect form, but looked the speed and did not figure. However, he did shine in the pole vault, running within an inch of his old record, 27 feet 2 inches, and taking first place, with James of Central second, and Patterson third. As Jack Spence, Dame Fortune took third place in the mile from Central, when Hawkins twisted his ankle. But it was just a narrow defeat as a record the D. I. A. L. runners, Eddie Ryan and Jack Collins, each getting their share of congratulations.
