

LEWIS CAPTURES MICHIGAN MEET--CHILLICOTHE COOK A STAR

Chicago School Athletes Win From Detroit University School by 3 1-2 Points—Many Records Are Broken.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., May 26.—Out of fifteen events at the interscholastic track meet yesterday and today won by the Lewis institute, Chicago, ten records were smashed to smithereens and two were tied. Two of the new records are world's interscholastic records—that of 6 feet 1 3/4 inches in the high jump by Patterson of Detroit, and of 23 feet 5 inches in the broad jump by Cook of Chillicothe. This is a remarkable showing, and reveals the fact that there are some very promising young athletes in this year's crop of preparatory school students.

The greatest work was done by Cook of Chillicothe, Ohio, and Patterson of Detroit, but their schools did not win the meet, the honor falling to the Lewis institute boys from Chicago. The score of Lewis institute was 36 1/2, with Detroit University school 33, Detroit Central 28, and Chillicothe 20.

Cook Indeed a Wonder.
 The achievement of Cook was something that will probably not be witnessed again at an interscholastic meet in some time. He won the broad jump by smashing the world's record to pieces, and captured the pole vault, and 100 yard dash by tying the old Michigan record, and, in addition, ran the last lap in the two mile relay race, in which his team came third.

Patterson's feat in the high jump yesterday is found to have been much more notable than given out at that time. He was announced to have cleared the bar at 5 feet 11 1/2 inches, but today it develops that the height was 6 feet 1 3/4 inches. Trainer Fitzpatrick has carefully investigated the case and authorizes the new record.

Lewis institute can well be proud of its work. Vickery lowered the record in the quarter by one second, narrowly beating Nicholl of the same school. Talore landed second in the mile run, Vickery second in the 220 yard dash, Edwards second in the half mile, Nicholl second in the broad jump, and Rennacker second in the discus. Rennacker tied for second in the pole vault, while numerous thirds and fourths were secured by Lewis institute.

Lewis Team Consistent.
 For a consistent team of point winners the Chicago lads were unsurpassed.

The schools that secured minor places in the meet were Michigan Military academy, Orchard Lake, 13 points; Grand Rapids, 11; Ann Arbor, 10 1/2; Clinton, Ill., 5; Cleveland, 3; Plymouth, 2; Hyde Park, 2; Battle Creek, 1. The records broken were: Mile, Hannevan, Detroit Central; 220 yard hurdles, Malcolmson, D. U. S.; half mile relay, D. U. S. team; half mile, Ballhatchet, Michigan Military academy; 120 yard high hurdles, Torrey, D. U. S.; quarter mile, Vickery, Lewis institute; broad jump, Cook; high jump, Patterson; discus, Strellinger, Michigan Military academy; shot put, Horner, Grand Rapids.

TRUCE IN BASEBALL WAR.

Contending Factions in Western League Lay Off Until June 2.

OMAHA, Neb., May 26.—An armistice was agreed upon in the threatened Western league war this afternoon. The managers of all the clubs arrived in the city this morning in response to a call issued by Vice President Myrick of the league for a meeting tonight to take action on the trouble between Cantillon of the Des Moines team and Rourke of Omaha.

This afternoon Cantillon applied to the District court for an injunction restraining the managers from meeting tonight, but soon afterward a mutual agreement was reached that a meeting be held here June 2, provided President O'Neill does not call one earlier.
