

**WORK OF HORNER FEATURE
OF MEET AT ANN ARBOR.**

Grand Rapids Athlete Shows Wonderful Versatility in Preliminary Trials of Michigan's Interscholastic Games.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 24.—[Special.]—Horner's versatility in all branches of track and field athletics, from shotputting to hurdling, landed the Grand Rapids high school in the lead soon after the tenth annual Michigan interscholastic meet had opened on Perry field this afternoon. From all indications the lead will be a safe one, with Horner qualified to bring in at least one more first in the hurdles tomorrow morning.

When the field events were over tonight Grand Rapids had 10½ points; Morgan Park View, 8; Detroit Central, 2 2-3; Chicago North Division, 2½; Chicago University High school, 2; Saginaw, 2; Muskegon, 1 2-3; Plymouth, 1; Ann Arbor, 1-3; and Arthur Hill school of Saginaw, 1-3.

The lad who gave Grand Rapids its start smashed two records while piling up the points. He put the shot 90 feet 4 inches, smashing the old record of 84 made by himself last year. In the pole vault he made 11 feet 1½ inches, raising the old mark one and one-half inches.

Chicago's contingent cut a much bigger figure in today's results than was expected. Now those Detroiters and upstarters who reckoned without Morgan Park and Lewis are beginning to wonder whether they can prevent the Windy City athletes from taking the banner home.

Nicholl of Lewis started things Chicago's way when he won the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 8½ inches. He showed much better form than did any of his competitors. McMullen, also of Lewis, got a point in that by jumping 19 feet 3 inches.

Mills starred for Morgan Park. He drew second place in the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet 7 inches, qualified for the quarter mile, took first in his heat in the 220 yard dash, and first in his heat in the 100 yards. He will meet some stalwart men in the finals tomorrow. It looks as if Widman of Detroit Central and Bastar of Benton Harbor would defeat him in the hundred and that Woodcock would get him in the quarter mile.

Tilley, also of Morgan Park, drew one point by throwing the discus 97 feet 6 inches, giving him fourth place in the contest. Watts got second place for Morgan Park in the shotput with a heave of 45 feet and Harper won his heat in the quarter mile, although in the slow time of :38.

Lake View's three points were scored by Lundy in the discus, with 110 feet 7 inches.

Claussness qualified for Lewis in the 100 yards in :10½ and in the 220 at :28½. He is not looked on as a possible winner of either.

D. Butler qualified for the Institute in the quarter mile.

University High will have Smith in the 120 yard hurdles, Kulocher in the quarter mile, Wampler in the 220, and Morris in the low hurdles tomorrow. Morris won his heat today easily in the best time of all, 27½ for the low hurdles, but the other C. U. H. men were not away up in the list of qualifiers.

McMurry tied with Dick of Muskegon and Hawkins of Detroit Central for first in the high jump at 6 feet 7 inches, and Smith brought one-third point to his school by tying with two others for fourth in the pole vault, at 19 feet 6 inches.

Rogers split points with Page of Grand Rapids when they tied at 11 feet in the pole vault after Horner had vaulted 11 feet ½ inches. They tossed up for the medal and the North Division lad got it, alone with ¾ points for his school.

The meet so far has been slow and relieved only by the performances of the Grand Rapids phenomenon. Rumor has it Horner is going to the University of Chicago next year.
