

WIN SECOND PLACE AT BIG STATE MEET

MUSKEGON HIGH TRACK TEAM MAKES SHOWING AT LANSING.

SHAW AND DICK THE STARS

Local Athletes Win First High Hon-
ors in History of Local School
at Big Meet.

The Muskegon high school track team, the best that has ever represented the school and the only one that has ever brought home high honors for the Red and White, overturned the dope at Lansing Saturday afternoon when in the annual Central Michigan Interscholastic field day they won second place among the 25 competing schools in the meet's events.

Was Great Meet.

The meet was the classiest that was ever held under the auspices of the Michigan Agricultural college and the work of the local men was the sensation of the day. Eleven new records were set, one tied and one established in the 13 events that were run off.

The local team as its share of the day's honors came home with 20½ points, scoring one first, four seconds and two thirds in the various events besides tying with Detroit Central for the division of a third place.

Ann Arbor Beaten Out.

The first place in the meet went, as was expected, to Detroit Central, although if Muskegon had had a little turn of luck, the City of the Straits men would have had to have been careful of their laurels. The Detroiters won 29 points, Muskegon 20½, while Ann Arbor finished third with 11. Grand Rapids came sixth in the list, with seven points and was tied at that by Big Rapids.

The first medal place that Muskegon won came in the pole vault event when George Shaw broke the record by clearing the bar at 11 feet, one inch. Shaw's work was the sensation of the day and it was responsible for Muskegon's fine showing in the meet.

Many Stars on Local Team.

The work of Clifton Dick was the main stronghold of the local's work. Although he won no firsts, the Muskegon star picked up several seconds and thirds and he garnered in the large share of the local's tallies.

Cowley in the mile event surprised the field by winning a second place, while Beukema showed great form when he ran a close third in the half mile. Couthie won a third in the quarter-mile and Pattie would have also placed had he not been hopelessly boxed in.

Was Big Surprise.

Dick's work in the low hurdles came as one of the surprises of the day, the local man pushing Garrels for first place and finishing a close second. If Muskegon had only had more practice at the event the local school would have beaten Ann Arbor out in the half-mile relay, but as it was the showing made in running second was a feature of the day. The finishes in the relays came as a surprise to all. Muskegon was unable to show in the weight events, where a few points were looked for from Dick and Frost. Following is the day's summary:

Half-mile run—Sullivan, Grand Rapids, first; H. Smith, Detroit, second; Beukema, Muskegon, third. Time 2:03 4-5; new record.

Mile run—Kennedy, Stockbridge, first; Cowley, Muskegon, second; Utte, Grand Rapids, third. Time, 4:47; new record.

120-yard low hurdles—Final heat, Garrels, Detroit, first; Dick, Muskegon, second; James, Detroit, and Shaffer, Muskegon, tied for third. Time :15; new record.

Running high jump—Stalkes, Detroit, first; Garrels, Detroit, second; Cryder, Grand Rapids, third. Height, 5 feet 7¼ inches; new record.

Running broad jump—Purson, Traverse City, first, Lewis, Memphis, second; Runner, Shelby, third. distance, 19 feet 9½ inches; new record.

12-pound shot put—Lormansbine, M. M. A., first; Kohler, Lansing, second; Conklin, Ann Arbor, third. Distance 42 feet quarter inch; new record.

12-pound hammer throw—Kohler, Lansing, first; Kress, Memphis, second; Vosper, Ionia, third. Distance, 161 feet; new record.

Pole vault—Shaw, Muskegon, first; Rouch, Ferris Institute, second; Dick, Muskegon, third. Height, 10 feet 11 inches; new record.

One-fourth mile relay—Central, Detroit, first, (Stoddard, James, Garrels and Widman; Muskegon, second, (Pattie, Couthie, Frost and Dick); Ferris Institute third. Time, 4 minutes 48 1-5 seconds; record established.

One-half mile relay—Ann Arbor, first, (Lehdorf, Roper, Mills and Cornell); Muskegon, second, (Pattie, Couthie, Frost and Dick); third, Memphis. Time, 1 minute 39 1-5 seconds; new record.
