Scores Three Firsts in Weight Events, With One Man, and Sets a Record.

BOTH DETROIT SCHOOLS WELL UP IN STANDING

Expect to Come Through Strong on Track—Baptist Team Not at the Meet.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 21.—The close of the first day of the eleventh annual interscholastic track meet of the U. of M. sees Lake Forest prep college team in the lead with 15 points and also carrying off the glory of breaking the only record smashed during the day. It was the work of one athlete that brought the Chicago school all her points and the new record.

Alberman is the athlete, he coping first place in all three weights and setting the new record in the clean throw. He hurled the plate 120 feet 2 inches, which is 19 feet 1-4 inches more than Ralph Strickfugger, of the M. M. A., the former record holder, did in 1906, when he set the mark. Alberman tried for a mark in the hammer throw event after winning it with a shove better than 150, but his best was 145 feet 1 inch, more than 2 feet under the record set in 1904, when he represented Central.

Detroit Schools Well Up.

Both the Detroit schools, Central High and D. U. S., are well up especially so when it is taken into consideration that they were both pretty low down in the standings. All of these were decided this afternoon, leaving the nine track events to be finished in the morning. D. U. S. has 1-1 points and Central has one but will be a right close race if it will not be a right warm up for next Monday's year. The Lake Forest school has about its work, having lost two other men here, one for the half-mile and another who qualified today in the 220 yard dash.

On account of the light entry it was found necessary to run preliminary heats in but four events, including dance and the two hurdles, and both Central and D. U. S. did well in the heats especially Central.

Pleanty of Men Left In.

The latter school sent two men in the 100, 200 and 400 yards, and one in the low hurdles, James being the only Centralist that started in these four events. D. U. S. had two men in the 100, one in the 200 and one in the 400. Markson, who represented Ann Arbor, had two men in for the 100 in the two of the four events. Markson, with eight points, and Joyce Park, of Chicago, with nine, are the two men designated opponents of the Detroit schools, but both feel confident they will beat them.

Central and D. U. S. each scored five points in the high jump, in which little Bob Hawkins was the star, jumping 5 feet 10 inches, then his own right, and winning first place with a mark of 5 feet 2 inches. Stalker and Gerrits of Central avoided the ropes by making second and third places, and jumping one or two feet, respectively. Alberman of High Park took the fourth place.

Some of the Surprises.

One of the surprises of the meet was the failure of Corwell, Ann Arbor's track sprinter, to qualify in the 100 yards and the 100 feet in the 100 with a third place. Schmitt of D. U. S. was also of some failure.

to show in either hurdles. Bob Hawkins wisely stayed out of the hurdles and confined his efforts to the field and by so doing brought home all of the D. U. S. points tying with Runner of Shelby for second place in the broad jump, at 21 feet 7 inches, one inch less than Clippinger the winner.

The morning's program will start at 9 o'clock, and if it is not run off any faster than this afternoon it will take all day. There were more officials on the field than contestants, and a newspaper man had small chance unless he was a personal friend of the high mogul, whose friends all endeavored to busy themselves by bottling or hauping somebody. The meet is far from the standard of previous years in many ways. The entry list, though small, is good, however, each school evidently having picked only its best. Grand Rapids, which entered the largest number of contestants, is not here at all, they deciding to withdraw when Sullivan in their state turned his ankle, killing at least eight points.
