

SPIEGEL LOOKS LIKE REPEATER

John Probably Again Will Be Champion All-Around Athlete at D. U. S.

By winning two of the three events that he started in yesterday, J. Spiegel, the crack D. U. S. all-around athlete, has an excellent chance to repeat his performance of last year when he won the right to have his name engraved on the W. A. Sturgeon trophy, an honor which the University school athletes strive for each year, during the indoor season.

The events in which the boys must figure include, besides the 20 yards dash, 30 yards high and low hurdles, which were contested yesterday, are the two-mile, mile run, quarter-mile, 220 yards dash, pole vault, high jump and the 12-pound shot put. All of these, with the exception of the two-mile race, have been decided. The longer event will be held over until the Saturday permits the boys to get out of doors. Then all the events contested will be included in the competition to decide the winner.

Yesterday marked the annual exhibition of the gymnastic exercises, and a large crowd, mostly relatives of the students, were accorded a treat. It gave one an inside view of the excellent system employed by the east side institution's physical department.

Just at the present time, a serious problem confronts the Elmwood people as to how to get around to all of the more important outdoor work and at the same time reap all the glory possible. Both the Cornell and Ann Arbor meets are scheduled for the same time in May and to decide which of the two to attend is what is worrying the faculty.

There is a chance that the Cornell date will be changed from May 22 to May 8, thus avoiding a conflict. If the change is made, as D. U. S. will send a team to both meets and will have plenty of time to prepare for the Evanston contests, scheduled for May 28.

Age Limit Bars Some.

At Ann Arbor, D. U. S. will be considerably weakened by the absence of several of its best men, through being barred by the age limit. The only men at D. U. S. who would be eligible to compete in the Michigan classic would be the Spiegel brothers, Tom, Barton and Richie. Bobby Hawkins, who ran last year, has reached his majority and is not included.

However, at Cornell these men would be permitted to run, and with its full strength, D. U. S. is confident that it can repeat the victory of last year, when it defeated all of the strong open school teams of the east including the highly touted Mercersburg academy squad.

Up at Central, though practically through with its indoor meets, the little band is working daily in preparation for a strenuous outdoor season, particularly the Ann Arbor affair from which event it carried away the championship last year.

Prior to that, Central will engage in a triangular meet with Toledo high school and Ann Arbor high school, at the D. A. C. field some time in the early part of May. And there is a chance that the north-enders will send a team to the invitation meet at Muskegon.
