

## TEAM GOING TO CHICAGO

**D. U. S. Will Seek Honors in  
Princeton Alumni Meet on  
February 22—Many Schoolboy  
Stars Are Entered.**

### LOCAL BOYS DO NOT ANTICIPATE CLEAN-UP

**Five Athletes Will Make Up  
Kendrigan's Team—Should Be  
Strong in the Dashes as Well  
as the Hurdles.**

That Detroit University school will be represented in the big indoor meet under the auspices of the Princeton alumni at Chicago, February 22, is now a certainty. It was decided yesterday to send a team from the Blue and Red school to try for honors in what is expected to surpass, in point of attendance and the class of prep-school stars entered, anything ever before attempted indoors in the middle-west.

The local school isn't going to the Windy City feeling as though it is going to make a grand little clean-up, as even a thought of such a thing would be foolish. But the boys who are going to make the trip are the best that east side school boasts. They are going with the hopes that the Blue and Red will be somewhere near the top of the winning list.

Five men in all have been selected to represent the local school at Chicago, all of them tried and true in past performances. Johnny Spiegel will be depended upon to flash his colors in front in the 40 yards dash and the 40 yards high hurdles. The latter event will be a new one for Spiegel, but in practice he has shown fair ability over

The other two events that D. U. S. has entered are the half-mile and the mile runs. Candler will look after the former, while Noble will have the best wishes of his team-mates in the mile. Entries for all events were filled and mailed to the Chicago promoters by Physical Director Kendrigan last night.

**Handicap Meet Saturday.**

Saturday afternoon the first of a series of handicap track meets will be held in the D. U. S. gym. Every student who is physically able will take part. In this way the physical department expects to bring out every bit of available material in the school.

There will be seven events: The 20 yards dash and low hurdles, 12-pound shotput, high jump, quarter-mile, half-mile and potato race. This afternoon the D. U. S. basketball five will play a collection of ex-Central high school basketball players in the D. U. S. gym, starting at 4:30. The D. U. S. reserve team will tackle the Windsor collegiate team. Friday the representative team of the Elmwood avenue school will play the alumni, also in the D. U. S. gym.
