

TWO MEN LOST TO LOCAL TEAM

Dunbar Sullivan and Noble Will
Be Unable to Compete
on Saturday.

Almost on the eve of the team's departure for Lansing, where it takes part in the fifth annual field and track meet on the M. A. C. field, it develops that one man D. U. S. counted heavily upon the help it in the night will be missing, Dunbar Sullivan, of whom much was expected, is unable to represent the school and his loss at this time will be greatly felt by the charges of Coach Benson. Added to this calamity, Noble, the Elmwood avenue school's dependence in the mile run, is out with a twisted ankle and there is no chance that he will be able to compete Saturday.

Dunbar Sullivan has been ailing since before the football season started and since the close of the gridiron schedule his condition has not improved much. For that reason the senior Sullivan refused to grant permission to his son to run. Noble turned his ankle while running in practice recently, causing an injury that is serious enough to keep him out of the competition.

But the remainder of the boys are struggling gamely daily to prepare themselves for the carnival. Tuomy and Barton, the two veterans, with Fraser Sullivan, Newman, Bateson and Welch, are fast rounding into shape and they will cling to the hope that the majority of the points will rest with them.

Tuomy, Barton and Fraser Sullivan are getting all the encouragement possible, as the coach realizes that the burden of the work will fall on their shoulders. Tuomy has been entered in four events, the broad jump, 100 and 220 yards dash and discus throw. Fraser Sullivan represents his school in the discus, 100 yards dash and shot put. Barton is selected to uphold the colors of the school in the pole vault, high jump and broad jump.

With Noble out of the running, D. U. S. will abandon the idea of going after the honors in the distance runs. Bateson has been showing fairly consistently in this event, but it is doubtful whether he will be taken along. In his previous workouts the best time he has been able to make was 510, which in all probability would not place him.

Coach Benson hopes to offset the effect the loss that Dunbar, Sullivan and Noble will have on the team by selecting Newman, a sturdy runner, in the 200 and quarter-mile. The newcomer has been showing pleasing form to the coach, and much of the load has been lifted off his mind. D. U. S. will make no effort in either the hammer throw, high hurdles or distance runs.

With the departure of Al Spengel from school, not one of the famous team remains to wear the Red and Blue, but in Tuomy, Fraser Sullivan, Newman and Ken Welch, Mr. Benson expects to gather together a speedy quartet for that event. Should any of these men fail to show the required speed, from lack of condition or other causes, Barton will be substituted. Coach Benson laughs at the idea that he will resign from the job as coach of the track team. Benson figures that some alleged wise person arrived at the conclusion that he had left the school, just because he was out of the city on a business trip last week. Benson declares that he never gave the question a thought and says that he will be with the boys until school closes in June. So much for that yarn.
