Flock of Michigan's Young Athletes Ready for Big Ann Arbor Meet.

When the pistol cracks, starting the first trial heat of the 100 yards dash in the neighborhood of 200 prep school track stars from all parts of the state will begin the struggle on Ferry field, Ann Arbor this afternoon in an effort to win the coveted honor and trophy that they long have coveted. So the intercollegiate classic of the mid-Atlantic two hundred to three hundred athletes will be the most important of all unlikely that many more marks in the athletic world will be made than in the past.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the meet, through out the state. The meet is the first of the preparatory school track meet since the teams are much better balanced than in other years. One of the teams to enter from Muskegon high school came away with the 400 yard share of the spots, two Detroit schools and two from Chicago and had everything pretty much their own way. In the 100 yards race, Detroit Central again proved the title four times, Detroit University school three times, Lewis Institute of Chicago, one occasion and Michigan Park high school of Chicago, one. A total of ten times that the four institutions have divided the honors among themselves.

Much of the interest will be centered in the work of the schools from the smaller cities in the state. At Lansing, Mich., little fellows caused an era of trouble to the teams in the water polo meet and the work done in the past and throughout the contest continually cut into the larger schools' points just where the latter were reputed to be strongest.

Adrian and Shelby Duncanson.

Adrian and Shelby were the most consistent ones to kick over the track, particularly Adrian in the distance runs. John Velego, on the other hand, was the most reliable on the baseball team, captured the half-mile mile and was second in the two-mile run. Adrian was expected to secure 10 points. And with an equal chance there is no reason to believe he will not repeat.

Shelby Duncanson was the best runner through the long sprints and dash off seconds or thirds that kept the team in a position to challenge all through. Traverse City, Mich., will make the end of trouble. From this point it appears as though the first night will be between Central and S. Shelby and Muskegon with a chance that Grand Rapids might slip in and copy. Considerable entry in the nature of a try-out for future meets, the Bostonians for instance, think that the young will be rather tough for beginners to oppose.
