

MUCH INTEREST IN EVENTS

The athletic meet for Seventh and Eighth grade boys, held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon at the park, was successful in every way. Over thirty entries were received, the preliminary or trial events being held Thursday afternoon. The Washington and Charles Briggs schools were represented by the largest number of contestants and the former easily captured both the greatest number of points for individuals and schools. High school students acted as judges and timers. Next year, if a meet is held, the students will qualify according to weight and not as school classes. The committee feels that a good start has been made and is well satisfied with yesterday's results.

Ribbons were awarded the winners in recognition of their work. Blue represented first; red, second; white, third; green, fourth; and yellow, fifth. These prizes were awarded in each event, while special prizes are to be given those scoring the largest number of points individually.

In the seventh grade event, Samuel Pascoe and Hyacinth Harder tied for first, with 11 points each to their credit. William Jilbert captured second, with 9½ points, and Frank Ryan third with 7 points. In the eighth grade events, August Frederickson won first with 12 points, Irving Goulette, second, and John Blasco, third, the latter capturing seven out of nine and one-half points made by the Charles Briggs school.

The Washington school won the meet with 96½ points to Charles Briggs, 9½. In the relay races banners with the boys' names making up the team will be awarded. The following are the records made by the students in each event:
