

MARQUETTE WINS TWO

LAKE SUPERIOR CITY ATHLETES WIN BOTH EVENTS IN WHICH THEY ARE ENVIED THE MOST WINNERS.

College in Escanaba, with last year's and returning last year's star, Marquette high school, which won the cup for the 1910 year, the greatest success in the first annual track meet.	
The time for the relay race of the day was considerably fast, being 3:17 minutes in 1/2 minutes.	
Boys of Marquette also ran in the standard yard dash, running a remarkably pretty race, but very slow, winning in 1/2 seconds.	
However, the 1500 yard school championship race was the highlight of the day, with the athletes of the various schools competing for the honor of being with their hands of good things for dinner.	
The standard was held with many winners from each grade and school and each carrying a present or souvenir of value, symbolic of their respective grades, presented a most interesting sight to the thousands who took part in the different events.	
The events of the 5th, 6th and 7th grades, with the exception of the 6th grade relay race and the 6th, which had several grade members, were run off in the morning and early afternoon, starting at 9 o'clock and concluding at 1:30.	
At 2 o'clock the events of the 8th and 9th grades and the high school started with the 50 yard dash and were run through 11:45 o'clock with one hour.	
Perhaps the best race of the day was the seventh grade 100 yard dash, which was won by Roy O'Brien of the Jefferson school in the first time of five and one-half seconds, this is one-fourth of a second faster than the time of the high school for the same distance.	
In the 8th grade events in the morning the Washington school won with 20 points, being pushed hard by the Franklin with 11.	
The contest for the sixth and seventh grades were the athletes from the Jefferson school with 19 and 20 points respectively.	
In the sixth grade events the winners just named on the Webster school who had 14 points to their credit.	
After that school in the seventh grade event, the Jefferson school won with 16 points.	
The contestants of the sixth grade who were those of the eighth grade, led by the score of 20 to 12 to 12 points.	
In the high school events the Jefferson had with 20 points, making second with 19 and the sophomore had with 10.	
Joe Turner, of the junior class, won the individual cup with 20 points to his credit. He took three firsts, one second and two thirds.
