

SMITH AND SCHULTZ WIN MICHIGAN MEET FOR EASTERN HIGH

Two Athletes Bring to Bay City Its First State Track Championship, Scoring 18 Points Between Them; Carman Smith Takes First Place in Three Events and Schultz Wins a Third and a Fourth; They Also Help to Place Eastern Second in the Relay.

DETROIT, June 8.—Carman Smith and Harry Schultz won the Michigan Schoolmasters' Interscholastic athletic meet at "Bob Lo" today for Bay City Eastern high school, scoring 18 points. Wayne was the runner up with 15, and Grand Rapids Central was third with 13 1-8. Saginaw Eastern was sixteenth in the list.

Today's victory establishes Eastern as the track and field champion of Michigan. Only a week ago the Bay City squad won the northern Michigan championship at Saginaw. That was Eastern's first undisputed northern Michigan championship; today's victory is Eastern's first in a Michigan championship meet.

Carman Smith alone scored as many points as Eastern's nearest competitor, Wayne high school. The blond sprinter won first honors in the 100-yard dash in 10 1-5 seconds, first in the low hurdles in 26 3-5ths and first in the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet 1 2 inch.

Eastern Second in Relay.

Harry Schultz contributed three points. He was a good third in the high hurdles, which Corbin, the Alpena star, won in slower time than he had skimmed the higher barriers at Saginaw the week before. Then Harry added another point by placing fourth in the discuss.

These boys, Carman and Harry, together with Frank Perkins and Sheldon, composed the team that won second place for Eastern in the half mile relay race. Ann Arbor won this event.

Sheldon, West Branch's remarkable distance runner, won both the mile and half-mile events in convincing fashion. His running mate in the Saginaw meet, McKay, did not finish among the first four in either event.

Eastern had only three men in the field except in the relay race. Cedric Smith, brother to Carman, took part in the weight contests, and though he did some fine work, failed to place.

Large Schools Not in It.

The larger schools, Detroit Central, Muskegon and those which had been considered as likely winners in the dope up to Saturday morning, were not in it. The points were so scattered that it was practically a one man meet all around.
