

JINX TAKES TRACK HONORS FROM LOCALS

Three Distinct Misfortunes Figure in Muskegon Boys' Defeat.

MILLER A DISAPPOINTMENT

Trusts to Sprint at Final, Always Sure Before, Is Bested.

Though not being inclined to squeal when beaten, the representatives of the Muskegon high school who returned from Bob Lo yesterday, where Muskegon tied for fourth place in the first Michigan interscholastic meet, could not help pointing out what a big part hard luck had played in the losing of the meet for Muskegon.

The most conservative estimates would give Muskegon 10 more points and the honors of the meet easily had luck broken anyway near even for the local school. Miller could have added two more points in the mile, Castenholz was sure second and a probable first in the quarter mile had he not sprained a ligament in his leg and Cleveland was disqualified in the broad jump, which alone would have won the meet on a questionable decision of touching on the other side of the take off. This jump, when measured, was 20 feet 3 inches, and Smith of Bay City Eastern who won this event, thus winning the meet for his school, only leaped 20 feet one and one-half inches.

One Event Would Have Won

Had Cleveland not been disqualified Muskegon would have had 17 points and the meet while Smith would have gotten second place which would have given Bay City Eastern 16 points for second place.

It is alleged that the Judge of the broad jump did not know any more about that event than was absolutely necessary and that several men stepped over the take off and their jumps were counted. No one is absolutely positive whether or not Cleveland stepped over but if he did, it was only one spike at the most that touched and whether he stepped over or not it was the hardest kind of luck for it lost Muskegon the meet and Cleveland his "M."

Next to the broad jump the hardest place of luck that Muskegon encountered was in the quarter mile. Castenholz was in rare form and won his heat in 55 seconds flat although the track was rather slow and had bad angles in it. In winning this heat, the Muskegon runner sprained a ligament in his leg and was unable to run in the finals.

Coch Wilson said this morning "Castenholz certainly looked fine for a place and I think he would have taken a sure second and a probable first had the accident not happened."

Would Have Meant Second Place

If Castenholz would have taken second place it would have given Muskegon 3 more points, a total of 15, which would have tied for second place with Wayne, or rather Cross of Wayne, and had Castenholz taken first, which was very likely, it would have given Muskegon 17 points for an undisputed second place.

In the morning, or rather before dinner, for it was after noon, Miller ran in the half mile and found in Sheldon of West Branch, a runner who had just as much sprint at the finish of a distance run as he did. The half mile is not Miller's race and he would have been satisfied with second in that had he taken first place in his own race, the mile run. Owing to a ruling that only one entry from each school should be permitted in the race McCrea, the second Muskegon entry did not run.

Miller Loses in Sprint.

Miller was not feeling any too well when he started the mile run, late in the afternoon. He was rather careless for, knowing that Sheldon had an awful sprint, he left everything to the finish. He had a chance to get a good lead at first but did not take it, preferring to sprint it out at the finish with the West Branch runner. He found Sheldon a little stronger and the Muskegon captain was expected to set a new Michigan interscholastic record in the mile run, had to be satisfied with second place in a 4:44 1-5 race.

Barlow's Feat a Surprise.

One of the surprises of the day for Muskegon was the fact that "Bink" Barlow took second place in the high

hurdles, beating out Big Jacks who took fourth place. Barlow won his heat and came back in the finals in great shape, showing pure nerve and with good form, instilled in him by "Pinkey" Shaffer in the last few weeks, chopped down the high sticks and finished second. That race gave Barlow his "M". Big Jacks finished fourth.

In the low hurdles, Young Jacks ran second in his heat and in the finals finished third. That ended Muskegon's point getting.

The Muskegon points, Miller 6, second place in mile and half; Barlow 3, second place in the high hurdles; Young Jacks 2, third place in the low hurdles; Big Jacks, 1, fourth place in the high hurdles; total 12 points.

Misner Loses Relay.

The relay which did not count in the points but for which a beautiful cup was offered nearly came to Muskegon also, but again luck defeated Muskegon. Ashley led off and gained about three yards on the field. Cleveland ran second and gained about three more and McCrea, who followed, added another two yards, to the total and, with everything depending on Misner, he could not stand the pace and Muskegon took third place. Had Castenholz not been injured, the relay cup at least would have been brought back to Hackley gymnasium.

One Man Teams Take Firsts.

Bay City Eastern took first place in the meet with 18 points, due to the phenomenal work of Carman Smith who took first place in the 100 yard dash, low hurdles and the broad jump.

Wayne high school took second place in the meet with 15 points all made by Cross the sensational weight man who won the hammer, shot, and discus. His marks in none of the weights excepting the shot were anything sensational, his hammer throw, falling about 20 feet below that made by Beach, the former Muskegon star weight man.

Up to the last event, the broad jump, Wayne, through the spectacular work of Cross, was leading by a margin of two points and the only chance to deprive Wayne of the verdict was a win for Bay City Eastern of second place in the broad jump. The rest of the nearest competitors, Grand Rapids included, virtually had abandoned hope in this event and were contented to acknowledge defeat.

Bay City Eastern, however, still had a chance. Just a matter of two points separated it from Wayne for a tie score and three points needed to triumph. Carman Smith, Bay City's star, was entered in this event and success meant prestige for himself and his school; defeat blighted hopes. Smith had been working hard all afternoon, taking points here and there and to capture another first, his own teammates felt, was asking too much of him.

Worth the Effort.

It was worth the effort, though, and seeing everything if he won and nothing if he lost, he took the chance. His first leap was just fair. On his next turn it was a little better and on the third more improvement was shown. This time the officials with the tape announced 20 feet 1-2 inches. That was the effort that created a new champion in Michigan interscholastic and thwarted the best efforts of the wonderful Cross.

Grand Rapids is Third.

Grand Rapids took third place with 13 1-8 points. This alone shows that hard luck was responsible for the defeat of Muskegon, for Grand Rapids did not have a ghost of a show in the dual meet at Muskegon May 18. The meet Saturday closed the local track season and, in fact, as this is the last week of school and test week, Saturday closed Muskegon high school athletics for the school year of 1911-12.


