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er himself with glory and he is the only one to bring back a gold medal unless Misner annexes first place in the low hurdles. George won the hammer throw, heaving the 12 pound ball a distance of 131 feet 5 inches.

Although the high jump was won at 5 feet 7 inches and Armstrong has done 5 feet 9 1-2 inches, still the best he could do yesterday was fourth place which gave the Muskegon school a point.

That Muskegon has no show is evident when it is considered that the best they can possibly get is 11 points which would do them no good. Six points are salted down and all the other ones that can possibly come are through Misner in the low sticks and Fred McCrea in the mile run.

Breaks Pole Vault Record

Joe Horner's interscholastic pole-vault record of 11 feet 3 inches was broken by Foss, of the University high, of Chicago, when he floated over the bar slightly over 12 feet of ether between him and Mother Earth. The exact measurement showed that he had vaulted 12 feet and 9-16 of an inch. Every precaution was taken to have the measurement correct, and it will be taken as official.

Foss's performance not only establishes a new interscholastic mark, but also sets a new one for Ferry field.

The record for the big athletic field was 11 feet 6 inches and Foss had some of the best pole-vaulters in the university watching him with eager interest. The Chicago lad really won the meet when he had cleared 11 feet 8 inches but he was allowed to go on with the expectation that he would establish a record.

On his first attempt, he soared 11 feet 6 inches without any connection with the bar whatever. After the shaft had been set at the 12-foot mark he made two unsuccessful attempts and it seemed to the spectators that he was striving to do the impossible. On the third attempt, however, he made the ascent in grand style and touched the bar with the hem of his shirt only on the way down.
