### ARMSTRONG BACK IN FORM

## Failure of Hammer Tossers to Equal Past Records Costs Locals Meet.

Lansing, Mich., June 9—With a total of 14 1-2 points, eight of which were contributed by Armstrong, Muskegon took fourth place in the seventh annual championship interscholastic meet held here Saturday. Grand Rapids high, coached by T. Dinsmore Upton, a graduate of the Muskegon highschool, annexed the meet with 19 2-3 points.

From past performances the Muskegon hammer tossers, Kimball and Robbins, should have taken first and second places in that event which would have given the meet to the Gudelsky outfit but as it was Robbins allowed Blacklock with a little hurl of about 126 feet to run off with the event, while Kimball did not even place.

#### Armstrong the Big Man

For Muskegon, Armstrong was the high point man, coming back to early season form in the high jump, which event he won at 5 feet 8 inches. After a hard race he was beaten out for first place by an inch in the high hurdles.

Mike Kanitz, although but a freshman, took home 2 1-2 points for the Muskegon school, tying for second and third places in the pole vault and winning the second place medal on the flip. Barlow added another point by a fourth in the high sticks while Robbins' three points in the hammer throw brought up the total to 14 1-2.

Blacklock of Grand Rapids, was the biggest factor in the meet, knocking down 13 points with ease, and winning the gold watch offered for best individual winners. He won the hammer at 126 feet 9 1-2 inches and the shot put at 44 feet 5 1-4 inches, both marks far below the interscholastic records. He also ran second in the high jump. Beatty was responsible for the other points.

The showing made by the Detroit team was the surprise of the meet. Reich was the only man who had been touted as having anything, but both Williams and Captain Wyatt loomed up as dark horses and took the high and low hurdles respectively. Captain Wyatt ran a pretty race in the preliminaries and finals of the high hurdles, winning the first in 17:2 and the finals in 18 flat.

#### Runs a Great Race

Van Aken, of Coldwater, ran a great race in the 440, coming in about 12 yards ahead of the field and breaking the record with a mark of 51 1-5 seconds. Loveland, of Saginaw, by a great sprint in the last 50 yards finished second, coming from last place.

The big sensation of the meet, however, was Sheldon of West Branch, who won both the mile and half-mile. His time in the mile of 4:43 3-5 is 10 seconds faster than the Michigan interscholastic record formerly held by George Cowley of Muskegon, and his mark in the half of 2:04 1-2, but one second slower than the record. Van Aken, of Coldwater, nearly nosed him out in the half.

Gamble for Coldwater, snatched the hundred from the fire in 10 1-5, equaling the record, and walked in ahead of the field in the 220, in 23 4-5.

Lansing's relay team easily outclassed everything in Class A, winning by 80 yards. St. Louis had a harder time winning the class B. Both teams get permanent cups.

Corbin, of Alpena, who was expected to break the records in both hurdle events, did not enter because of bad knees that were injured at Ann Arbor.

The weather was cold and windy, and the track a little slow, which ac-

counts for the general slow marks of the day.
