Lansing out door track team for 1914 is the strongest and most well balanced track team in the school's history. Of course, such stars as Christopher and Kohler are missing, and appear only once in a decade, but still taking into account the all-around ability of Harvey and Healy, coupled with the assistance of the rest of the team, Lansing appears to have an excellent chance to carry off first honors at the Michigan Interscholastic, held at M. A. C. on June 6th.

May 2d the squad journeyed to Alma, and won by the decisive score of 76 to 37. Again three high school records were broken. Healy made the 220 in 23 $\frac{3}{5}$. Baske the half-mile in 2 min. 10 sec. Gardner and Harvey cleared 9 ft. 8 in. in the polevault. The work of Miller, the All-State foot ball man, was the most promising. He heaved the hammer 139 ft. 10 in., which is 13 ft. further than the throw which won the Interscholastic in 1913. He also put the shot 39 ft. 10 in., which ought to win a place at M. A. C. Our championship relay team is almost intact, with the exception of Roscoe, who ran second last year. Ehinger adds strength to an already fast quartet.
