The second team was good, winning almost every game, and defeating the Grand Rapids seconds both times. In the major league, the Federals won the championship, taking two of three games from the Wolverines, the other claimant.

The cross-country was a victory for Muskegon High. For the fourth time the team won the annual race at Holland, and defeated the others by a comfortable margin of 18 points. Only three more races are yet to be run; for which there are spaces on the perpetual trophy. Muskegon is practically sure of keeping it, as Grand Rapids Y. will have to win all the remaining three, and if they do, they will only be tied with us for it. As practically the same team will run next year, Grand Rapids has a very slim chance of winning.

The men that composed the 1915 team were, Cone, Bennett, DeVette, Weaver, Fors, and Akin. Cone, Weaver, and Fors were the '14 men and the other three are new material. These six men had no difficulty at all in winning the race, and Cone finished first, clipping ten seconds off the record made by him the previous year, covering the course in the remarkable time of 21:47 3/5 seconds. Bennett, the second Muskegon man to finish, held the lead for the first mile, but did not know the course, and was compelled to drop behind. J. Vandevisse of Grand Rapids Y. fin-

ished second, about two blocks behind Cone, and P. Vandevisse finished third. Bennett finished fourth, close on the heels of the Vandevisse brothers. After Bennett came the Hope College captain, and then came DeVette and Weaver in the order named. Fors was the last Muskegon man to count, and Akin, being unfamiliar with the course, finished eleventh.

The men were all in good condition at the finish, while the other contestants were in bad shape. J. Vandevisse fainted at the finish and was unconscious for some time. Louie is now looking for another race for his team, and it is possible that in the near future another will be run with some other schools around the state.
