

L. H. S. Sprinters Working Hard For Ag Freshmen Meet

Shasberger's Indoor Squad Looks Stronger Than 1915 Track Team Which Were Defeated By First Year Men--Sheffer May Join High Team

Sprinters of the local high are working overtime, preparing for the M. A. C. Freshmen aspirants, who will invade the Y. M. C. A. Saturday afternoon to battle for track honors with Shasberger's lads. The M. A. C. Freshmen gave the high school a beating in outdoor track last spring, but the high lads are not regarding this defeat with any dismay for the M. A. C. Fresh are an unknown quantity. The Lansing track team, it appears, has much better material than that which composed the 1915 outdoor team, although the only veterans on the team are Gardner, Dumphy and Anderson. The missing places have been supplied mainly by first year lads.

If the meet was to be doped out by the records that the local hopes have lowered during the winter months, the meet would belong to Lansing before the start of the sprint, for Merritt has lowered the time for the mile from 5 min. 5 sec. to 5 min. 4 3/4 sec. The two Radford brothers and Merritt also lowered the record for the 440 yard dash by 2 1/2 seconds. These records, with the half mile record made by Whitney in the interclass meet last month will put the 1916 track team down in high school history as a record breaking crew.

The M. A. C. freshmen will probably cop the weight events, as Miller, who for the past three years has won the weights in nearly every meet in which he was entered has quit the track team. Hahn, Gardner and Dumphy will be the Lansing entries in this event. Merritt, who won the mile in the Detroit meet is one of the men depended on by Coach Shasberger, to bring home a first for the high school. Merritt should also place in the half mile, as he won third in the Detroit meet. Whitney and Rathbone will be the other entries for Lansing in the half mile. The two Radford brothers will be the best Lansing representatives in the dashes. They will be entered in the broad jump also. Dumphy is one of the Lansingites who will compete in the dashes.

Sheffer, who placed in the Inter-scholastic at Ann Arbor last spring may don a track suit and enter the dashes. Anderson will be entered in the relay, half mile and high jump. Anderson tied with Hamilton for first in the high jump at the Detroit meet, but both these men will probably be placed down in the list by

Williams, who won this event in the interclass fray, but did not go to Detroit with the team. Gardner and Hamilton will be the Lansing men entered in the pole vault. Twiss may compete in the pole vault for the boys, but Coach Ash of the basket tossers will probably forbid him entering the meet as his participation in the interclass meet slowed up his basket ball playing considerably. Williams, Anderson, Hamilton and Ash will be the Lansing entries for the broad jump. The events are as follows: 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, half mile, relay running high jump, standing high jump, pole vault, standing broad jump, shot-put.
