

ROWD WATCHING GIRLS IN ONE OF THE CONTESTS.

Children of Detroit's elementary schools, 10,000 of them, romped in the annual field day program at Belle Isle Friday.

And the number of elder folks who came out to witness the fête was fully as large.

Beginning at 10 o'clock, the preliminary events were run off every two minutes until 2 o'clock, when the finals started.

Jack Hatch, 14 years old and a pupil in the Irving school, doubtless carried away the big honors, although his feat of completing the 100-yard dash in 11 2-5 seconds received no further recognition than first place in class "C," in which he was enrolled. Jack weighs only 97 pounds and is a midget in comparison with others who made the short dash. On three or four other occasions he has won honors in short distance running in the school meets.

Leonard Buck, of Southeastern, completed the distance in the same time, but he was enrolled in class "A," which was composed of boys several years older and of considerably more weight.

Hancock school scored the greatest number of points in all events, a total of 5,483, and was awarded first place. Northern was second with 6,274, and Northeastern third with 3,880. Other schools that ranked high in the meet, in the order of the number of points scored, were: Palmer, Fairbanks, Harris, Moore, Owen and Marcy.

Dr. Charles E. Chadsey, superintendent of schools, presented each boy and girl who won either first, second or third honors in any event with a pin properly inscribed. Several children fainted because of over-exertion, but were quickly revived and were none the worse for their experience.
