Two Track Teams Tie in City Championship Meet, Scoring 31 Points.

There will be no High School track champion this year. The bonors will have to be divided by Central and Eastern, who tied for first place in the Interscholastic championship track meet at Northesastern High School Saturday. The two leading schools each scored 31 points.

Central led up to the last two events on the program, scoring all of its 31 points before then. Eastern began evening things up in the 220-yard dash when Wittman came through with five points, giving the Indians 29 points. Eastern did not expect to score in the final even, the pole vault, but Nelsch, the Indian pole vaulter, took third place for two points, tieing the score. Northwestern took the relay, which ended the meet. The Colts won third place, with 28 points. The other scores were Northern, 12: Northeastern, 6; Cass, b: Southeastern, o.

Eastern grabbed the lead in the first event, the 25-yard dash, placing Wittman first and Newhall fourth. Central pulled up and passed the Indians in the other running events. It was in running rather than in the field that the Cass avenue school boys showed their strength, while Eastern's etrength was scattered over all events, the team being fairly well balanced.

Inability of Eastern to take first honors alone can be attributed to Sortor's illness. In previous dual meets he had made 15 to 20 points and had been counted on to show up in the short dashes, the 440 and the half-mile. He placed in but one race, third in the 440
