**Northwestern Athletes Show
Strength in All Events to
Beat Out Rivals.**

**Eastern Finishes Second and
Cass Tech Third—Day is
Individual Star.**

Fifteen hundred high school enthusiasts watched Northwestern high school romp away with first honors in the annual scholastic track and field meet staged at the armory Friday night. Eastern high school finished second, while Cass Tech runners were given third place.

Over 300 athletes from 11 Detroit high schools participated in the meet which was to determine the city prep school track championship. The 11 standard indoor track events were run.

Many features marked the annual struggles, although no records were recorded. Day, senior, track star at Northwestern, proved to be the individual point getter. This brilliant athlete obtained first place in both of the hurdle events besides placing in the pole vault. Day is planning to enter the University of Michigan next fall and should be a great asset to Captain Carl Johnson and his mates.

Battle for Second.

The fight waged between Eastern high school and Cass Tech for second honors gave the fans many chances to applaud. Kline, a record holder for the 440-yard dash, was replaced by his running mate Wilkens, who had an easy time coping this event. Butterfield, of Highland Park, gave the Cass star a hard run for the first lap, but lost time on one of the corners.

In the 880-yard Charter of Eastern, and Russell of Northwestern, crossed the tape at the same time. Officials decided to divide the points for that event.

Among the other big individual point getters were Blauman of Northwestern, Marshall of Eastern, Brinkert of Eastern, Snider of Northwestern, and Nelsch, track captain at Eastern. All these men proved valuable assets to their mates.

Credit to Pearl.

Credit must be given to H. N. Pearl, Detroit high school athletic director, who managed the affair, which was one of the most successful track meets ever attempted and furnished the fans much excitement.
