

Central High Wins Normal Track Games

LOCALS ARE CROWDED; SATURDAY INTERSCHOLASTIC IS BRILLIANT.

By the narrow margin of two points Kalamazoo high won the Western State Normal's fourth annual interscholastic track and field meet, Saturday afternoon. The locals scored 23 points and were hard pressed by their opponents throughout. Twenty-two schools registered points scored, demonstrating that a splendid class of athletes from widely scattered institutions participated.

RACE IS HOT ONE

Grand Rapids Central, Detroit, Eastern, Detroit Northwestern, Battle Creek and Cass City were leaders after Kalamazoo's first honors. The total team scores follow: Kalamazoo, 23; Grand Rapids Central, 21; Detroit Eastern, 21; Detroit Northwestern, 19; Battle Creek, 15; Cass City, 13; Detroit Central, 8; Highland Park, 8; Wayland, 6; Grand Rapids Union, 6; Belding, 6; Paw Paw, 5 1-2; Rockford 5 1-2; Grand Rapids South, 5; Allegan, 3; Bangor, 2; Hastings, 2; Otsego, 2; Bay City Western, 1; Detroit Northern, 1; Three Oaks, 1; Lansing, 1; Plainwell, 1.

Kalamazoo scored 16 of its 23 points in the field events. The Detroit schools showed strongly in the dashes. The 440 and 880 were easy for Weeks, of Battle Creek, who was individual point winner of the meet. Little Cass City uncorked a couple of stars in Brooker and Gowan. The former set a record of 110 feet 7 inches in the discus, while Gowan set a mark of 52 2-5 seconds in the 440 yard dash. A sensational feature of the meet came when Brinker, of Detroit Eastern, won the mile in 4:41, the best former record having been 4:47 2-5, made by Cooper, of Detroit Central in 1917.

The meet was splendidly conducted throughout. Coach Spaulding had his track in fine condition, while the visitors were accorded excellent entertainment. Luncheon and supper were served at the Normal school and fully 250 competing athletes sat down to the tables.

Carbonne is a mighty tough middleweight, one of the toughest in the game and either Brown or Fisher will make a good opponent for him. Matchmaker Charles Best is now working on the bill and promises to have a high class program arranged. Michigan doctors will be in Kalamazoo at that time.

Future shows for the local club are also under discussion. One now being prominently mentioned is a bout between Homer Smith and Bartley Madden, probably about June 3 or 4. The other will be a double wind-up bill. Elmer Hogan, Michigan's welterweight champion, and Johnny Lewis, of Toledo, will appear in the two main bouts against worthy opponents.

Homer Smith, Michigan's heavyweight champion and Captain Bob Roper, of Chicago, have been matched to box a 12 round bout in Des Moines, Iowa, Wednesday evening, May 19. Roper is now enroute to the Iowa metropolis and Homer leaves tonight.

Tommy Ryan, promoter in that town, is predicting a bumper crowd for the event, as both Smith and Roper have won bouts there and are favorably known. Billy Randall will accompany Smith on the trip.

Elmer Hogan, a former Kalamazoo boy and welterweight champion of Michigan, was introduced to the Friday evening crowd. He fights K. O. Brown, at Cincinnati, May 19. It is a 15 round bout.
