

SAULT HIGH IS WINNER OF MEET

Local Thirty-clads Get 55.5 Points; De-Tour Second.

Also Baseball Champions; Tourney a Decided Success.

The above figures are all that is necessary to tell the story of one of the biggest track meets held in Chippewa county in years. The local high school team brought back the championship pennant for both the track events and the baseball tourney.

After winning from DeTour in baseball Saturday morning the locals met a picked team from both DeTour and Pickford in the afternoon and defeated it by the score of 12 to 3.

The mile race was won by Harper from the Soo, who was followed close behind by Hunt also from this city. The time in which this run was made was 5.28.

Elliot and McNaughton both of the Sault high school divided honors in the half mile race.

Lehman, of DeTour, the biggest individual scorer at the meet, won the 440, 220 and 100 yard races. He outran Freedman who was locked forward to as a big scorer for the Sault. Lehman scored 15 points for DeTour of their total 24.

The mile relay race, which was probably the most interesting race of the day, was won by the Soo. Hunt and Harper, the locals fast men, again showed their prowess and stacked up a few more points for the Soo.

McNaughton of the Sault took first place in throwing the shot and a DeTour man was a close second.

Cecil Wallis won the pole vault. He went over the bamboo at 8 ft. 7 inches. Wallis is from the Soo.

Aitken of the Soo won the high jump and Lehman of DeTour received the ribbon in the running broad jump.

Although improvements on the meet might have been made, it is the consensus of opinion that Pickford was very successful in the undertaking of putting on the meet and the locals appreciate very much

the way in which they were welcomed at Pickford.

It is quite certain that no more track work will be done this year.

Messrs. Emer, Ozmun and Sessions were right on the job all the time looking after the athletes and keeping them in trim.
