

Record Entry List for Interscholastic Closed

Lansing High School Considered Strong Contender for Meet Honors at Aggie Saturday; Sixty-Three Schools Send Squads to East Lansing.

Sixty-three schools and nearly 600 individual athletes compose the entry list for the fifteenth annual State Interscholastic track meet to be held on the Michigan Aggie track and field Saturday. This entry exceeds the list of the largest meet ever held in the state before by 22 schools.

Practically every high school in the state boasting any sort of a team was on the list when Director C. L. Brewer, of the Michigan Aggies, who has been appointed manager of the meet by the M. I. A. A. officials, closed the slate last night.

Lansing high was among the leaders with a list of 20 athletes. The Lansing team, having the advantage of being able to enter all of its men of any ability and of being situated so that the athletes are not called upon to make a tiresome trip immediately before the games, is expected to prove a strong contender for the state title.

While it has not proven an exceptionally strong contestant in track before, it is believed that the red-clad square will put in its strongest bid for honors this year. Among the leaders in the state in every other branch of sports, the school is being closely watched in its cinder-path performance.

Prelims Stated Early.

All preliminary heats, including those in the 100-yard dash, the 220-yard dash, the high and low hurdles, will be run off in the morning starting at 10:30. Finals in all events will be staged in the afternoon.

It was a notable feature of last year's combined Interscholastic and Intercollegiate meet that every event was run off on schedule time. The same thing will be done with each event on tomorrow's program, and the afternoon session which is to open at 1:30 will close shortly after 4:30, according to that plan.

In each event on the program the three groups of schools, A, B and C, will compete separately. That means that in the afternoon, 25 separate races and field events will be run off.

According to the program there will be a running event every five minutes with field events and

weight events being staged at the same time. This will tend to give several times the action to the meet that is generally found among such affairs and will liven things up greatly for the large numbers of spectators who will witness the games.

In each event, Class C will compete first, Class B second, and Class A third. Entries in the events will be given first and second calls and will be required to meet the clock in reporting for participation.

Aggies Have a Big Job.

That the athletic association, the Varsity club and the Track club of Michigan Aggie, the three organizations co-operating in preparations for the meet, have a task of no small dimensions on their hands is evident. With them lies the job of making the meet a success from every angle except that directly connecting with officiating in the events.

For several weeks they have been arranging housing and entertainment for the visiting athletes and in this they have had the co-operation of all fraternities and the entire student body. In addition, they will get the teams on the field, supply men for calling events, assisting the officials, and handling the crowds on the field.

This year's meet is the first in six years which has been sanctioned by the M. I. A. A., and made an official meet for deciding the state track championship among high schools. Such meets are to be annual affairs now, and the heavy response to the Aggie-planned games makes it seem probable that they will be East Lansing affairs if this one is run off in good order.

In addition to the other arrangements which they have made the Aggie organizations have prepared to banquet the entire body of high school athletes and coaches tomorrow evening immediately following the meet. More than seven hundred men will be entertained at this time.

Floyd Rowe, of Lansing, will act as referee of the games and J. E. Hasselmann will act as clerk of the course. The judges, starters and timers will be experienced track officials picked from among Lansing men, faculty men and varsity men of the student body.
