## EASTERN GETS

## 17, CENTRAL 15

City Championship Indoor  
Meet Will End Saturday  
Night at Armory.

Northwestern qualified 19 men, Eastern 17 and Central 15 in the preliminaries of the high school championship indoor track meet at Northwestern High Wednesday. The finals will be staged at the Armory Saturday evening.

The showing made by the Colts Trackers came as a surprise as the Pelevard school has not shown well in dual meets this year due to the loss of George Snider, captain and leading point scorer of the team, and several other point winners of last year. Apparently this handicap has not seriously affected the morale of the Northwestern athletes for they came through in front in the elimination heats.

Not alone did the Colts qualify the greatest number of contestants for the finals on Saturday but their relay team made the fastest time of any in the trials and is picked to win the event despite the strong team which Northern High has in the field.

### EASTERN'S CHANCES SLIP.

Eastern High's chances were considerably weakened through the loss of Capt. Marshall McCausland, star starter-miler, and Huntington, leading jumper, both of whom are ill. Both of them were practically certain to win their events. McCausland holds the state record for the 40.

Central High, one of the weakest in track last year, showed unusual strength placing 15 men and a relay team in the finals. Central runners in the dashes, the hurdles, the quarter and mile made the best times in the trials. The Trailblazers may not win the meet but they will prevent other favorites from running up top heavy scores.

Northern High placed 10 in the finals and has no more than an outside chance to be anything more than runnerup. Western, Northwestern and Southeastern also qual-
