SEVERAL RECORDS DADL.

The meet was a complete success in that two city records and one state mark were broken and one city record equalled. Harold Davis, of Northwestern, broke the record for the 440-yard and equalled the 220 mark. Prout, of Central High, broke both the city and state scholastic records in the pole vault, fracturing the former by three and one sixteenth inches and the state mark by one-sixteenth of an inch.

Davis was expected to take the 140 from his chief rival. Marshall-McCausland, of Eastern. The latter was out, however, because of liness. It was also figured that Davis had a chance to break the mark of 58 3-5 seconds, which he had set last year. His new mark is 58 1-5 seconds.

It was not thought that Davis would win the 220 from George "Buck" Hester of Northern High, who last year set new state records for 100 and 220 yards, especially since Davis had only a few minutes before the 220, Davis ranhis record, breaking 440
