

## CITY'S PREP RECORD IN SHOT PUT FALLS

**Howard Hamilton, Eastern, in Trials at Police Gymnasium, Creates New Mark of 43 Feet 4½ Inches; Dailey, Hester Show Speed; Eastern, Central, Northwestern Qualify Most Performers.**

One new city interscholastic record was established during the trials for the fourth annual high school indoor meet that were held in the new police gymnasium at Deaubien, Clinton and McComb streets, Wednesday afternoon.

Howard Hamilton, Eastern, put the 12-pound shot 43 feet 4 1/2 inches, three inches further than John Stuart, his old team-mate and erstwhile record holder, did in 1921.

It was ruled that records broken in field event trials were as legal as those made in the finals, but because of the difference in conditions between the police and armory tracks, only the time made on the latter course would be accepted as official.

**Dailey in Fast "Quarter."**  
Dayton Dailey, Cass Technical, ran the fastest trial in the quarter-mile dash. His time was 55 seconds, considerably faster than the city record. He is apt to lower the city mark, 58 1/4, held by Harold Davis of Northwestern in 1922, in the armory final Saturday if his competitors keep on his heels.

George Hester, Northern, skinned over the 220 yard dash in 29 1/3 seconds, this time being better than the city record of 29 1/5 held jointly by Carl Blauman and Harold Davis, Northwestern. If the Eskimos "human express" runs in form Saturday, he is apt to take away the laurels of Davis and Blauman against whom he formerly competed.

As expected, Eastern, Central and Northwestern qualified the greatest number for the finals at the armory Saturday. Central and Eastern had 19 each while Northwestern had 18. Northern was next with eight. Cass Technical landed seven. Western and Southwestern had three each. Commerce did not enter. Northeastern and Southwestern failed to qualify and will not be represented in the finals.

**Miss In One Event.**  
Northwestern failed to make the high jump grade but has at least two athletes available for eight other events. Incidentally, the Colts displayed the fastest relay team. In the 20-yard dash and the shot three Red and Gray carriers passed. Only one is good for the "half," and one goes in the high hurdles.

Eastern has two each in the 25-yard dash, the hurdles and the high jump, three each in the mile and the half mile, one each in the pole vault, shot and the 220-yard dash. Three Central athletes are eligible for each of the two hurdle races. In the "440" the Blue and White will be worn by two contestants, one is ready for the 220, and two for the 200-yard dash. One will go in the half mile and one in the pole vault. Two are up for mile and the high jump.

Harold Rutwell, Eastern Miller, nearly lost a chance to qualify by taking it too easy in his favorite event. He loafed along apparently without a care in the world until after three runners had passed him and he was next to the last in the

## GENARO AGAIN IS SUSPENDED

**Ban by New Jersey Boxing Commission Effective in New York.**

New York, March 7.—Frankie Genaro, who captured the American flyweight championship from Pancho Villa last week, has found none too smooth his path as a title holder.

The diminutive east silder, following disappointment over the fact that Villa, instead of himself, had been selected for a world flyweight title bout with Jimmy Wilde of England, learned today that he was again under suspension by both the New York and New Jersey state boxing boards.

According to Louis J. Messano, chairman of the New Jersey commission, Genaro's suspension, due to his failure to get through with a match with Villa in Newark last December, was lifted only temporarily after the title bout in Madison square Garden.

It was done at the request of the New York State Athletic commission and on the condition that the boxer pay \$1,000 to the American Fair play foundation for losses incurred in trying to promote the Newark match. Genaro refused the sum but of his share of the prize in the Garden bout.

The suspension, however, which is recognized in this state under the terms of a working agreement between the two commissions, went automatically into effect after the title contest. Mr. Messano said and will not be lifted until Genaro boxes in New Jersey under conditions to be fixed by the state ring boards. These conditions, Mr. Messano added, probably would be stipulated by the commission when it meets in Jersey City tomorrow.
