

ELEVEN MARKS FALL AS COLTS WIN CITY MEET

Eastern Finishes Second in Annual Track Events; Northern Third.

LEAD CLINCHED IN RELAY

Victors Create New Record in Deciding Contest; Falcons Blanked.

Eleven shattered records in 15 events and Northwestern's success over Eastern signalized the running off of the third annual city championship interscholastic track and field meet Saturday afternoon at Codd field.

Northwestern amassed 59 1-2 points, Eastern 41, Northern 21 1-2, Central 29, Cass Technical 13, Western 10, Southwestern 5 and Southwestern I. Northwestern was shut out.

Former marks in the mile, 440-yard run, 220-yard low hurdles, 220-yard dash, javelin, pole vault, high jump, discus, broad jump, hammer and relay perished. Those for the half-mile run and 100-yard dash were seriously endangered, the contestants falling by a tenth of a second in each.

Colts Score in Field.

Almost unlimited strength in the field events turned the current for Northwestern against Eastern. In the seven tests, the Colts secured 15 1-2 points and balanced this by grinding out 29 on the track. In every event but the discus, the Red and Gray scored. The lowest total was one in the hammer throw.

First in the pole vault was decided, in which Percy Froul, Central, raised the record to 11 feet 8 inches. Eastern and Northwestern were tied at 41 each. Northwestern picked up a 1-2 in the event and then needed first place in the relay to clinch the day's honors. The Colts not only won the event but broke the record made by Northern, 1:24, last year. Northwestern was caught in 1:23 7-16.

Special credit is due the officials for their excellent work in finishing off the events. The meet started at 2:15 and the last event was over at 5:40. Had it not been for an unavoidable delay in the pole vault and hammer throw, an earlier closing would have been recorded, stating it in less than two hours, and showed the ability of the men in charge.

Shilwell Takes Mile.

Records perished right, left and center. Harold Shilwell, Eastern, contributed the first shock of the afternoon by trouncing Jerry Nymberg, Cass Technical, in the mile. In doing so, he sliced four and one-tenth seconds off the time made by Paul Sutton, Central, in 1922. Shilwell made 16 in 4:59 2-16. Nymberg was thought to be an easy winner, but lost by 15 yards. Leroy Buckman, Northwestern, was a few yards back of Nymberg and had a lively brush for third place with Vothie, Southwestern.

Falcon Dailley, Cass Technical, atoned for his defeat by Lowell Blumhardt, Northwestern, in the 440-yard dash at Ann Arbor a week ago. Dailley overhauled the Colt captain in the last 275 yards, passed him, and broke the ribbon in his 2:34, nearly three seconds faster than the former mark made by one.
