

## STATE PREP HONORS GO TO NORTHWESTERN

**Colts Beat Out Lansing For Michigan Interscholastic Track Title by Scoring 31 1-3 to Their Nearest Competitor's 19; Eastern Third, Northern Fourth; Dailey, Chatman, Hester, Prout Record Breakers.**

East Lansing, Mich., June 9.—Northwestern of Detroit led the field today at the close of the seventeenth annual interscholastic track meet with 31 1-3 points, the Colts scoring in 19 events.

Lansing, with 19 points, secured second, Eastern of Detroit was third with 16, and Northern of Detroit fourth with 13 1-3. Twelve other schools participated in the scoring. Arthur Hill of Saginaw led this group with 12; Detroit Central, 11-12; Detroit Western, 11; Detroit Cass Technical, 8; Ann Arbor, 8; Highland Park, 6; Saginaw Eastern, 5; Grand Rapids Central, 3; Jackson, 2 1-2; Muskegon, 2; Detroit Southeastern, 2, and Pontiac, 1-3, were the schools next in order.

Seven records in all were broken, six during the finals with one made during the trials of Friday. George Hester, of Detroit Northern, in the 100-yard dash trials Friday, covered the distance in 9 4-5, equalling the world's interscholastic record besides breaking that of the state.

**Hester Takes "220."**

Saturday, Hester went 220 yards in 21 7-10 for his second record. Prout of Central Detroit, created another new feat for the pole vault by going 11 feet 3 inches, his best competitive performance of the season. Julius Chatman, Detroit Northwestern, threw the javelin 158 feet 3 inches, Dailey, Cass Technical, negotiated the 400-yard run in 51 3-5 seconds.

Hart from Arthur Hill of Saginaw, broke a record that had endured since 1908 when he got over the half mile in 2:03 1-10, one half a second faster than the former mark. In the relay, Northwestern was caught by two watches in 1:31 4-5.

The Colts' time better the national interscholastic record held by Lewis Institute of Chicago, as did that of Lansing High, runner-up, but since only two watches were on each team, it is not probable that this mark will be recognized as other than a state record.

**Matter of Inches.**

Hester won the 100-yard final in 10 seconds flat. In lowering the 220-yard performance, he ran almost a dead heat with Victor Lachinsky, Northwestern. At the tape, Hester won by a matter of inches. This race was one of the closest of the meet.

Six records were established today and Hester's new time in the century made on Friday raises the total to seven for the fastest interscholastic ever held on the Michigan Aggie Field. In practically all events in which new time or distance was not established the performers came close.

**Dailey Comes to Front.**

Dayton Dailey, of Cass Tech, ran an exceptionally fast quarter mile and established a new time of 51 3-5 seconds for the event. Prout of Central added six inches to the pole vault light when he cleared the bar at 11 feet 3 inches to win from Al Thorpe, of Highland Park.

Chatman of Northwestern turned in the unexpected by winning the javelin over his team mate, Northrop, and at the same time estab-

### DRIVERS WAIT 100-MILE RACE

**Twenty-two Dirt Track Pilots Entered in Long Grind at Fair Grounds.**

**Time Trials Will Cut Number of Starters to 12; Plan Speedway Here.**

Thunder at motors and crack of exhausts will be heard at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon on the mile speedway of the Michigan State Fair grounds when 12 of the fastest cars that can be put on the dirt will start the 100 mile auto race for \$10,000 in prizes.

The race is the first of this character—an open race—in Detroit in years and is expected to develop into a real battle and to smash all dirt track marks from one to 100 miles. Indications point to a monster crowd. Arrangements have been made to care for 50,000 people. Police have been assigned to care for the safety of the public.

Practice trials have developed a speed of upwards of 88 miles an hour—the track is like a concert floor—the turns broad and the stretches extremely wide and there is no necessity of cutting off power on the turns.

**Twelve to Start.**

The gates will open at 1 o'clock and at noon the technical committee will examine the cars and doctors will examine the drivers. At 1 o'clock the qualifying trials will be held—the fastest 12 starting in the big race at 3 o'clock.

Indianapolis A. A. A. speedway plans will be followed throughout. A huge score board with block numbers has been erected so that everyone will know at any period of the race just where any car stands. Contrast rules will govern in every detail.

Detroit will have an unusual interest in the race because of the number of drivers from this city and that it will be the first time that local drivers who have achieved fame on other tracks will show their speed before the home folks.

lished a new record for this event of 158 feet 9 inches. The seventh record was established in the 800 yards run by Hart, of Saginaw Arthur Hill, who did the distance in 2:03 1-10. This was the oldest record broken, the former time of 2:03 3-5 having stood since 1908, when it was established by Sullivan of Grand Rapids Central.

Spence, Western's single representative, scored 11 points for his school. He won both the high and low hurdles and placed in fourth in the broad jump. Had he entered more, he might have collected a few additional titles for the Cowboys. Trophies carried away by Northwestern, winner of the meet, included the Harvard cup, a perpetual award, the Albin relay cup, the Michigan Aggie championship plaque, and the Michigan Aggie Relay trophy.

It is the third time that Northwestern has won the Harvard cup, but Northern's name on the list of winners, breaks the line of successive victories necessary to gain permanent possession of the large trophy.
