



For the third successive year Central finished in the runner-up position in the interscholastic city indoor track and field meet. The team was well balanced as was evidenced by the fact that we scored in nine out of a possible eleven events in the city meet. The points were made, however, by second, third and fourth place positions. The lack of two or three individual stars was the reason for our not finishing in first place. With two or three men to garner first places our team would have, indeed, been one to be proud of.

Our ability to score heavily in all events in dual meets was responsible for the success the team had in those meets. Four schools in succession fell to this

dual meet strength, Northwestern winner of the city meet, being the only school to win from us in dual competition.

The policy of the track coach is to develop an all-round team if possible and let the stars, if there be any, spring naturally from this group rather than to primarily concentrate on the development of an individual or two. This makes for a broader track program and also assures each individual trying for the team equal attention.

The prospect for the outdoor season is good. No particular stars will arise as did Prout of last year but the school may be asssred of a representative all-round team that will be a credit.
