

COLTS' CHANCES IN STATE MEET FADE

EAST LANSING, Mich., June 7.—Detroit Northwestern high school's track team faces a hard battle today, if it expects to carry off the state interscholastic track title in the finals of Michigan Agricultural college's eighteenth annual meet here.

Before the trials yesterday, Northwestern, which easily won the city championship in Detroit three weeks ago and placed third in the University of Michigan interscholastic meet the following week, was the favorite to capture the state title for the second consecutive time. **KAZOO CENTRAL STRONG**

The trials yesterday however, revealed Kalamazoo Central is a serious contender and disclosed other strong state teams. Kalamazoo Central went into the trials with 19 athletes and eight of them qualified, half that many in two events. That is a strong front, considering the fact that no trials in the 880-yard run and mile are held and that the 880-yard relay trials were held over until today.

Northwestern qualified but five men, one less than Lansing, another school, which is making a strong bid for the state crown. The Colts however, are stronger than they seem, for "Jake" Widman, who has blossomed out as a versatile performer, qualified in three events.

Widman will compete today in the 120-yard high hurdles, 220-yard low hurdles and javelin throw. Jimmy Tait will run in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes and Glen Carlson, captain of the team, will be in both the discus and the shot put. Van Nortwick's mark of 44 feet 11 1/2 inches in the shot put trials yesterday, practically assured him a victory in that event. McMinn, by tying with Jones of Kalamazoo Normal high school, in the 220-yard dash trials yesterday, nosed into the finals, but it is doubtful if he will place today.

COLT'S HOPE IN RELAY

Northwestern's hope of supremacy will rest in a large measure upon the success of its relay team, and upon Ruckstahl and Seeger, who will make their first appearance today. Ruckstahl is the Colt's crack miler, and Seeger, of the best half milers in the country.

There are four events in which Northwestern will be without a representative. The Colts will not compete in the 110-yard dash, pole vault, high jump or broad jump. Robinson, Northwestern's Negro broad jumper, who set a mark of 22 feet 11 1/2 inches in the city meet, the best interscholastic performance of the year, is not in the broad jump finals. He ran in the 100-yard dash trials yesterday and placed in his heat, although he was shut out in the semi-finals.

Kalamazoo Central qualified in every event yesterday except the 220-yard low hurdles, shot put and discus. In the 440 yard dash, high jump and broad jump, the upstate school qualified two men in each event. Colley, in the javelin throw trials, watted the shaft 161 feet 8 inches and looks like a sure winner in the finals.
