COLLEGE FIELD, EAST LANSING, Mich., June 7.—Detroit Northwestern won the eighteenth annual state interscholastic championship track and field meet here today, scoring a total of 33 points. Kalamazoo Central was second with 24½ points and Lansing third with 19½. Before the 880-yard relay, the final event of the day was run, Northwestern was leading with 28 points to Kalamazoo Central's 24½. Kalamazoo was shut out of the relay and Northwestern clinched the meet by winning it. By its victory, Northwestern carries off again the Harvard cup, given annually to the winner of the meet, and also the Albion trophy for winning the relay.

BROWN SETS NEW RECORD IN TOURNEY

20,000 Persons See Athletes Perform in Olympic Tryouts

YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK, June 7.—Sensationalism and medocrity, it was agreed tonight, went hand in hand at the eastern sectional tryouts for the American Olympic team, glittering performances being turned in for the running high jump, the 800-meter run and 100-meter dash, while commonplace efforts marked the outcome of the remaining afternoon's events.

Leroy T. Brown, former Dartmouth man, skipped over the high jump bar at 6 feet 6½ inches, the greatest performance in the east this year. Jackson Scholz stepped 100 meters in 10 5-10 seconds, and Larry Brown, once of Pennsylvania university, ran through 800 meters in 1:53 5-10.

It was a great day for comebacks. Larry Brown and Scholz having been out of competition for more than a year. In addition, the elderly Pat McDonald won the shotput; John K. Norton, place winner at Antwerp in 1920, stepped home in front of the 400-meter hurdle field; Jimmy Connolly came back to get second to Lloyd Hahn, Boston stepper, at 1,500 meters, and Johnny Romig, ex-Penn Stater, cakewalked to the tape in the 5,000-meter run.

It was also a gala day for school boys. Sabin Carr, of Hill school, winning the pole vault at 12 feet 9 inches; Francis Hussey, Stuyvesant high, running third behind Scholz and Alf Leoney in the 100 meters; Bill Cox, of Mercersburg, placing second at 5,000 meters; J. H. Moody, Medford high; E. Everard, Stuyvesant, and Gail Robinson, Mercersburg, placing behind Brown in the high jump, and Frank Cuhel, of Washington high, Cedar Rapids, getting a blanket fourth in the high hurdles. Cuhel was scheduled to start in the 400 meter hurdles, his favorite event, but failed to arrive in time to compete.

FOUR TO BOSTON

It was announced after the games, which were witnessed by some 15,000 persons that the first four men in each event were to be taken to Boston for the final tryouts. Also the following: Coard Taylor, Princeton; Tom Campbell, New York A. C.; and Vincent Lally, New York, 400 meters; Orville Wanzer, New York A. C., shotput; Cliff Stowers, New York, 400 meters; R. Chesley, Syracuse, and Phil Reed, Mercersburg, 400 meters hurdles; Farrell, New York high, hurdles; Loren Murchison, Newark A. C., sprints.

Murchison, recuperating from a recent illness, retired from the 100 meter dash today after finishing second to Scholz in the semi-final heat in which the former Missouri flash established his new record.

John K. Norton, place winner in the Antwerp Olympics, won the 400-meter hurdle race from Dick Oram, New York, with a closing rush in 54 8-10, while the 400-meter flat race went to Vernon Ascher, Georgetown, with W. T. Martin and J. O. McDonald, Pennsylvania men, finishing two-three.

In the final heat of the 200-metres Fred Lovejoy, once of Cornell, nipped Alf Leoney in the stretch, winning by a foot, in 21 3-10.

SIX RECORDS SHATTERED

The meet was notable in that no less than six state interscholastic records were shattered and one Class A mark surpassed. Detroit lads were responsible for four new state records. Ed Spence of Western high school broke the state marks for both the 220-yard high and the 220 low hurdles.

The lanky cowboy seems to have the uncanny knack of lowering records in every appearance. He lowered both hurdle marks in the trials yesterday and then came out today and smashed his own records. Everett Pauschert of Detroit Northern lowered the record for the 440-yard dash and Seeger, Northwestern's crack half-miler, accorded the same treatment to the 880-yard run record.

Benny Onsterbann, Muskegon's great athlete, shattered the state record for the discus throw, and R. Cooley of Kalamazoo Central beat the best mark for Class A schools in the javelin throw.

Smith of Battle Creek established a new state record in the broad jump by leaping 22 feet 6¾ inches. Smith's jump beat the record of 21 feet 8½ inches made by George of Pejoskey in the Class B meet a week ago.

Only two of the eight Detroit high schools entered in the meet failed to score in the finals. Spence, Western's one-man track team, scored 10 points, tying Detroit Northern and Muskegon for fourth place in the meet. Spence and Henson, Lansing's star sprinter, divided high scoring honors, each scoring 10 points. Henson won both the 100 and 220-yard dashes.
