

Niles Cops Track Meet At St. Joe

Howe's Boys Pile Up Only 39 Points Against Opponents' 84

St. Joe's high school track squad was upset Saturday afternoon at wells field by Niles' well-balanced teams and as a result of the afternoon's 4 events Niles went home with the long end of an 84 to 39 score.

Take But Three Events

Coach Howe's men succeeded in capturing only three events—the 440 yard dash, the pole vault and the discus throw. Leo West won the 440 dash and discus throw and Helden and Norberg, both of St. Joe, tied for initial honors in the pole vault.

The rest of the events—11 in all—went to the Niles trackmen.

Dutt's Loss Heavy One

The loss of Dutt, injured a week ago, was sorely felt Saturday afternoon. The results of the afternoon's program might have been different had Dutt been out, for he would surely have copped in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, the javelin and perhaps in one or two others.

Niles has a well-balanced track team and while the luck broke with the invaders Saturday afternoon to a certain extent the south-end school is not to be denied a track squad of real merit.
