

# Four Records Beaten As Colts Retain Title

## Northwestern Takes Honors in Annual City Meet With 51½ Points—Loving Wins Individual Trophy.

Northwestern retained its supremacy in high school track circles by winning the fifth annual interscholastic meet Saturday afternoon at Codd field with 51½ points, a margin of nine points over Case Tech, its closest competitor.

Four new records were established, which marked the passing of the two oldest performances on the books, Glenn Carlson bettering the shotput record made by Clarence Simpson in 1922 with a heave of 49 feet 3¼ inches, and Charles Rose, while being defeated in the final Saturday, is credited with erasing the mark in the century dash by his sprint of 101.9 seconds in the preliminaries Wednesday afternoon.

Every school watered figured in the scoring, Central showing unexpected strength by finishing third with 14 points, Eastern was next with 15 and Southwestern took fifth place with its 12-point total, Northeastern advanced 11, Northern 9½, Hamtramck 6 and Highland Park trailed with a point and a half.

### Loving Leads Scorers.

Bill Loving, of Case Tech, was the outstanding performer in the meet, taking first place in the high jump and both hurdles, aside from running in the relay and finishing third in the discus. These achievements netted him the cup for leading the individual scorers with 17 points. More remarkable was Loving's performance in that he took no rest between events, and after winning the high jump, set new times in the 120-yard high hurdles by topping the timbers in 181.6 seconds, bettering the mark made last year by Edwin Spence, of Western, by seven-tenths of a second.

Loving was pressed over the entire card to gain his honor, and it was only the unexpected defeat of Glenn Carlson in the discus that enabled him to take the trophy.

While Carlson made a disappointing showing in the discus, he made victory certain for Northwestern in taking the shot put and hammer throws. He wasn't outdistanced in the hammer throw, as Alexander, of Case Tech, who finished second, trailed him by more than three feet in his best effort.

### Gowman Wins Discus.

The shot put furnished the first surprise of the meet when Carlson bettered the former mark by more than a foot and it was this event that started the Colts on their way to victory. Gowman, of Eastern, a rank outsider, caused an upset in winning the discus with a heave of 137 feet. Gowman's winning effort was his first attempt and though Carlson has bettered the mark repeatedly in trials, he failed to overcome the advantage gained by the eastern athlete.

Don Seeger, making his farewell appearance in high school competition, bettered his own time in the half mile, covering the distance in 2:05 3/10 seconds, to lead La Fleur who had turned in record time earlier in the season, by six yards. La Fleur set the pace from the start only to weaken in the stretch where Seeger, with a burst of speed, came from behind and was never threatened on his way to the tape.

Crowe Couss gave Northwestern its third record breaker when he led a field of 29 runners over the mile course in 4:44 4/5 seconds, clipping one-fifth of a second from the time turned in by Stillwell, of Eastern, in 1923. Couss jumped into the lead during the first lap and increased the margin with every turn of the oval.

### Relay Is Close.

The relay furnished the closest competition of the meet when Case and Northwestern ran almost on even terms for more than three laps and only a foot separated the teams at the finish. Kenneth Smith, lead-off man for Northeastern, after leading, fell rounding the first turn and this accident prevented his team from placing better than fifth.

Loving took the lead when the Falcon runner fell and held a slight margin as he passed the baton to Couss, who retained the advantage in his turn of the track. Eddie Tolan really won the event for Case when he increased the margin in leading Jimmie Tait to the wire. Gaines held the margin and all.

though pressed in the stretch managed to win by a foot. The runners were timed in 1:30 7-10 seconds.

Claiming that his team was the victim of interference on the part of several spectators, Coach McCros, of Northwestern, protested, but his claim was held over until next week, although officials claimed that no ruling could be made.

**Ross Fails to Repent.**

"Snitz" Ross failed to repeat his record-breaking performance in the century dash and finished fourth in the finals. Eddie Tolson, leading Lewis, of Northeastern, by a spurt in the last three steps to the wire. The Cass runner repeated this performance in the 250 when he again forged his way past Lewis to win handily. Tall and Ross, both of Northwestern, rated among the best sprinters in the city, were not able to stand the pace in either race.

Hamtramck gained first place in the javelin throw when Love hurled the spear 143 feet. Making his debut in that event in the trials Love had no trouble leading the other entries in the finals. Falconer, of Eastern, recorded the last big surprise when he annexed the pole vault, clearing the bar at 10 feet 8 inches.
