

COLTS AND CASS ARE BIG QUALIFIERS

EAST LANSING, Mich., May 30.—By qualifying 14 men in 10 events, Detroit Northwestern continued as favorite to win the nineteenth annual Michigan High School Athletic Association meet for Class A schools

at the conclusion of the preliminaries at the Michigan State College.

Cass Tech. was second in line, with seven men making the grade in six events. Ann Arbor and Detroit Southwestern each placed five men, the University City getting in five events and the prospectors in four, when Kuretic and Oldham both cleared 10 feet six inches in the pole vault.

In the 100-yard dash Northwestern will have Ross and Tait in the finals today, with Blocker of Ann Arbor, Easley, Benton Harbor, Tolan, Cass Tech, and Lewis, Northeastern, as the remainder of the qualifiers. The same field will also go to the marks in the 220 with the exception of Ross and one of the fastest races of the day is looked for with Folan of Cass as a likely winner after his performances yesterday.

Miethe of Escanaba ran an easy race in the 440-yard dash preliminaries, but will be pushed hard by Minshall of Hartford, Rogers of Kazoo Central, Kroll of Detroit Central and Cral of Lansing in the finals. Minshall had the best time

of the four preliminary races of Friday.

RECORD IS BROKEN

One state record was shattered when Wilson of Ann Arbor stepped out and in his first heave threw the discus 123 feet 7 1/4 inches, bettering the mark of 122 feet 3 1/4 inches made by Oosterbaan of Muskegon in the meet last year.

Glen Carlson of Northwestern and Fred Barratt of Lansing will put on a pretty dual for honors in the shotput, with Wilson of Ann Arbor and Dill of Saginaw Eastern as outside possibilities for first place.

Kalamazoo Central's pair of pole vaulters, in Hathaway and Cooley, look like the winners in this event, while Kuretic and Oldham of Southwestern, Oliver of Highland Park and Gulle of Flint will divide the rest of the places in the finals.

The Colt's star broad jumper, Robinson, came within 3/4 of an inch of tying the state scholastic record for this event when he leaped 22 feet 6 inches in the preliminaries. This mark is held by Smith of Battle Creek and was made in 1924.

SHOULD WIN HURDLES

In the hurdle races Loving of Cass Tech is head and shoulder above the rest of the field and barring mishaps the Detroit boy should win both the 120-yard high and 220-yard low hurdles this afternoon with Ross of Northwestern pushing him hard over the low barriers.

There's another feather in the cap today, because yesterday, on Ferry Wisconsin 81-54 in the dual meet

Six men lined up and left their places simultaneously. Michigan supporters, worried because their team was behind, knew that the Wolverines were weak hurdlers and were not expecting a majority of points in them. But the unexpected happened. Two Wolverines began emerging from the field when the race was about half ended. Hulse, running in perfect form, drew farther ahead and right behind was Walk, winner of the high hurdles. Then there came four other men, three of them of Wisconsin. Over the last jump came Hulse and Walk ahead of the rest. Behind them four other runners came at about the same moment, but Lasser, the third Wolverine sputtered to win third by a scant six inches, giving Michigan three places in an event they barely hoped to place in. That event put Michigan ahead.

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
