

Colts Set World's Record; Take Meet

EAST LANSING, May 30.—One world's record and four state interscholastic records were broken, while one state record was equaled in the nineteenth annual Michigan High School Athletic Association track and field meet, which Detroit Northwestern won with 38 points. Detroit Cass Tech was second with 34 2-3 points and Coldwater third with 8 1-3 points.

Until the relay, Northwestern and Cass Tech were battling neck and neck. The Colt quartette stepped out in the relay, shattering a world's record in the event when they were clocked in 1:31.2. The old record was held by Lewis Institute of Chicago at 1:32.4 since 1903.

As a result of their victory Northwestern took its second leg on the big Harvard Cup given annually to the winner of the meet, the Michigan State College Cup for state championship and the relay cup for winning that event.

LOVING HIGH POINT MAN

The meet was notable in that four other state records fell and one was equalled. Potter of Coldwater did what was expected of him when he turned a mark of 4 minutes and 33 seconds in the mile, leading the entire field from start to finish.

In the 880-yard run Kendrick of Mt. Clemens pulled a big surprise by defeating Seeger of Northwestern with a time of 2:01.5. His finish was too strong for the Colt runner to stay with. Rex Wilson of Ann Arbor broke his own record in

the discus which he established in the preliminaries yesterday. The University city lad threw the plate 124 feet 11 7/8 inches.

Clifford Robinson of Northwestern was responsible for the other new record of the day when he leaped 22 feet 10 1/2 inches in the broad jump winning from Gaines of Cass Tech and cinching the meet for the Colts.

Loving of Cass Tech was individual high point man with a first in both hurdles and a tie for first in the high jump which netted him 13 1-3 points. He also ran on the relay team that placed second, giving him a sum total of 14 1-12 points. Tolan, also of Cass Tech, was next high with firsts in the 100 and 220-yard dash and a member of the relay team for a total of 10 3/4 points.

WIDMAN WINS JAVELIN

In the pole vault a dark horse appeared in Newman of Pontiac, who tied Hathaway of Kazoo Central at 11 feet 6 inches. Kuretic of Southwestern and Cooley of Kazoo Central tied for third in the event.

Three men were tied at 5 feet 10 inches in the high jump when Gaines and Loving of Cass Tech

and Holbrook of Coldwater cleared the bar.

Another surprise came in the javelin when Widman of Northwestern stepped and threw the spear 156 feet 9 inches to a first place. Bator of Southwestern, who had the best throw in the preliminaries was second. Cooley of Kalamazoo Central who won the javelin in 1924 was third today.

Cass Tech added its fourth first place of the afternoon when Tolan won the 220-yard dash with Lewis of Northwestern on his heels at the finish. The time was 22.4 seconds.

Miethe of Escanaba won the 440-yard dash with ease, while Jones of Kazoo Normal High made a brilliant pull up on the home straight away to take second place. Miethe's time of 51.5 seconds was with 3-10 of a second of tying Pauschert's time made last year when he ran for Detroit Northern.
