

Northwestern Leads Field In Prep Track Meet Trials

Colts Live Up to Reputation in Preliminaries Friday—Lansing Qualifies Three Men—Cass Tech Looks Like Second Place Winner

Detroit Northwestern came up to expectations in the nineteenth annual Michigan High School Athletic association track and field meet in which the preliminaries and semi-finals for all events but the relay and distance runs were held on college field yesterday afternoon. The Colts placed at least one man and in the majority of cases several in each event. With a fast relay team and a string of dependable distance men there seems to be no question of their taking first honors in the meet for the third successive year.

Detroit Cass Tech, Ann Arbor, Kalamazoo Central, Lansing and Kalamazoo Normal high are the other schools to secure admittance into a goody number of the finals.

Outstanding of the performances of the day was the work of Wilson of Ann Arbor who deaved the discus out 123 feet 7 1/2 inches by bettering the record held by Bennie Oosterbann of Muskegon at 122 feet 3 1/4 inches. Robinson of Detroit Northwestern came within three-eighths of an inch from the record in the broad jump with a lead of 22 feet 6 inches. His chances of bettering that mark today in the finals are very good. Tolam of Detroit Cass Tech gave spectators a thrill when he ran the 100 yard dash in 16 seconds flat and later by stepping off the 220 yard dash in 22.3 seconds.

Detroit Cass Tech showed considerable strength which may rival that of Northwestern with Tolam, Gaines and Loving stepping to the fore in their events. Loving is the favorite in both hurdle events and it would not be surprising if he should break the record in either or both events.

Kalamazoo Normal High was one of the upsets of the meet to date with entries remaining in the dashes and the 440 yard dash. Lansing high qualified men in but three events. Barratt qualified in both the discus and the shot put and Cmall qualified for the finals in the 440 yard dash.

Detroit Northwestern is far in the lead in numbers of men who qualified, with 14 athletes in the race. Ann Arbor and Detroit Cass Tech follow with seven men each. Other schools qualified men as follows: Detroit Southwestern 4, Kalamazoo Central 4, Detroit Northern 4, Lansing 3, Detroit Eastern 2, Kalamazoo Normal 2, Detroit Central 2, Grand Rapids South 2, Battle Creek 2, Saginaw Arthur Hill 2, Detroit Highland Park, Coldwater, Pontiac, Escanaba, Hartford, Flint Hamtramck, Saginaw Eastern all one each and Detroit Northeastern 2.

Berlenbach-McTigue Fight On Bill Tonight
