

3 RECORDS BROKEN IN PREP MEET

Mosser Lowers Quarter-mile Record Again; Gowman Breaks Shotput Mark

Marsh Breaks Pole Vault Record; Ross Is High Point Winner

Northwestern High School demonstrated its supremacy in track and field in smashing fashion Saturday night, when the Colt athletes won seven of the 11 events on the annual Detroit interscholastic indoor track and field championship programme, for a total of 54 points. Cass Technical High School was second with 24 points. Northern third with 10½.

Three city interscholastic records were broken in the meet. Murray Mosser, Northwestern's star quarter-miler, set a mark of 57 1-5 in the 440-yard dash. In the trials Wednesday he set a record of 57 2-10 seconds, but he was a tenth of a second faster Saturday night. Merrill Gowman of Eastern estab-

lished a record of 46 feet 1 inch in the 12-pound shot put. The former record was 45 feet 11 inches, made by Glen Carlson of Northwestern last year.

Arthur Marsh of Northern High School set a new record in the pole vault, clearing the bar at 11 feet 3 inches. The former record was 11 feet 2 5-8 inches made by Percy Prout of Central in 1923.

Charles (Snitz) Ross was the high point winner of the meet. Ross ran a dead heat with Eddie Tolen of Cass in the 30-yard dash and won the 30-yard low hurdles. A penalty for beating the gun cost Ross not only a victory but possibly a record in the 30-yard dash. Although set back he was able to tie Tolen at the tape and the time of 3 4-5 seconds was 2-5 slower than the record. Ross' time for the 30-yard low hurdles was a tenth of a second slower than the six-year-old record of Day of Northwestern, but Ross equalled that mark in the semi-finals.

John Widman of Northwestern was second high scorer with 8 points. He won the 30-yard high hurdles and was second in the low barriers. Bill Loving of Cass, with a second in the high hurdles, third in the high jump and fourth in low hurdles and shot put, had 7 points.

Northwestern's team barely nosed out Cass in the relay. Northern raced against Eastern, each team being clocked. Over the distance of 4-9 of a mile, Northwestern was timed in 1:30. Cass was a second slower.
