MARKS FALL AS CASS LOSES IN LATE EVENTS

Tech Weakens After Grable Beats Tolan in Half-Hurdle Numbers.

Three records, two of which have been on the ledger since 1923, were erased Saturday afternoon at Codd field as Northwestern retained its high school track title against the strongest opposition it ever has been called upon to contest.

The Colts owe their victory to general all-around strength that netted them 53 1/2 points, to lead Cass Tech, their most feared rival, by 13 1/2 points. None of the other schools were able to keep abreast of the two pacemakers, although Northeastern showed surprising ability, to pull up with 18 1/2 points, and gained third place by a margin of three-quarters of a point over Northern. Eastern landed fourth with 15 and Central and Southwestern shared sixth ranking, with six points each. The other schools to cut in the point totals were: Western, 4 1/4; Redford, 3; and Highland Park, 1.

Walter Prezel, unheralded in athletics before this season, contributed heavily to Northwestern's total with 11 points, to gain individual scoring honors and displace Bill Loving of Cass Tech, rated the best all-around athlete in the city. Prezel gained his honors by winning the hammer-throw with a heave of 121 feet 11 inches, and placing second in both the shot-put and discus.

Cass Presses Hard.
Only two athletes, Gowman of Eastern, and Loving of Cass, pressed hard for first place. Gowman placed first in the shot and discus, while Loving won the high hurdles, shared first place in the high jump with three others and finished second in the low hurdles. While Northwestern won the championship by a wider margin over Cass than last year, its disparity was threatened until the closing events. With nine events completed, the two teams were tied with 22 points each. It was here that Prezel began to score heavily in the field events and put the total out of reach of Tech.

The real break in competition came in the half-mile, where Northwestern earned a surprising victory over Cass when Hart Tolan, generally considered the outstanding half miler in the city, was left far in the track by Grable. The Colt runner never gave a better performance. He was off to a good start and led over the entire distance, increasing his margin to five yards in the stretch as Tolan tired. Grable was timed in 2:04 1/2.

Hoax Sets Record.
Prezel was holding its own as the defending champion. But when Tolan failed to come through, he carried with him Cass Tech's confidence. From that point, the Wolverines were unable to keep pace with the Colts.
Prezel accounted for the first new record when he negotiated the low hurdles in 1:23 1/2 seconds, besting the mark established by Prezel in 1923, and was thought to be the

Eff of a second. The Colt hurdler was pressed to record time by Loving, but forged to the front over the final hurdle and gained his victory in the stretch.

This record breaking effort of Deane stood for his failure to come through in the stretch, his favorite event. Last year Deane set a mark of 1:18 in this century, but lacked the speed to make it. Tolan bettered Deane, but behind Eddie Tolan, of Cass and John Lewis, of Northeastern, Tolan was checked in 1:19 3/4. The Michigan sprinter, after a good start, grabbed the field near the half-way mark, while Lewis' came on fast in the last few yards to pass out Deane.

Tolan contributed a record shot-putting feat and one of the outstanding performances of the meet when he overcame the farthing in 37-1/8, where he again led Lewis to the lead. The previous mark of 37-5/8 was made by George Hester in 1923, and was thought to be the

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round approach, until Tolan unleashed his burst of speed Saturday.

The third mark fell in the relay final event on the card, where Northwestern came from behind to win in 1:24 2-8 slipping three-fifths of a second from the record established by the Colts in 1923. Cass rated on a par with the Colts prior to the event, tied near the finish, as John Lewis brushed by Couffer to give Northeastern second place.

Ross and Tolan, bitterest of rivals, ran the first leg, with Tolan holding a slight margin as he passed the baton. Jeannette took the stick from Ross and immediately forged to the front, giving Widman a five-yard lead starting the third leg. This margin never was threatened and Cass wasn't extended to breast the tape. The relay was one of the most interesting yet held in the city championships.

Because of a breach of the track code, no titleholder was named in the high jump, where Loving, Cass, Deasley, Northwestern, Johnson, etc. tied for first with leaps of 5 feet 4 inches.

While the jumpers were in the midst of breaking the deadlock, officials halted that the event was halted with the four athletes forced to divide the podium. It was this penalty that perhaps prevented Loving from retaining his individual supremacy.
