

Washington School Wins the Pentathlon

Nineteen Girls Get Gold Watches Presented By The Free Press.

Washington school won the annual Pentathlon test at Codd field Saturday, and Geneva Hobbs, a pupil of Washington, was named city champion.

She and nine others, making the 10 highest scores, were winners of gold watches presented by The Free Press, in addition to the 111 gold, silver and bronze medals, given by the health education department of the board of education.

Others Win Watches.

Following are the nine other girls whose high scores entitle them to Free Press gold watches, to be presented on field day: Mamie Harper, Hanneman; Glensdean Allbright,

Washington school will be awarded a silver loving cup on Field day, June 4, when 20,000 registered entrants from the schools of Detroit engage in the largest field meet ever held in the world.

To make the highest score of any of the 600 girls in the meet Geneva Hobbs made 4,496 points out of a possible 5,000. She made the obstacle race in 114.5 seconds; the dash and throw in 183.5 seconds; the 50-yard dash in 63.5 seconds; jumped 12 feet 16 inches in the running leap and threw the baseball 128 feet. She is 12 years old, weighs 85 pounds and is five feet tall. She is in the sixth grade.

Pattengill school was runner-up to Washington with 15 points. Lin-
